The United Church of God had 70 Feast sites (and 14 satellite sites) this year with a total of 15,216 brethren attending in person. The United Church of God also provided a service for those unable to attend with two daily national webcasts. Panama City Beach served the eastern time zones, while Klamath Falls served the western time zones. Only 233 brethren registered for keeping the Feast at home this year, compared to 292 last year.

In mid-August, Tom Damour began serving as interim pastor for the congregation in Lubbock, Texas, following the death of Pastor Dan Taylor.


At the end of September, Aaron Creech was appointed as the pastor for the congregations in Mansfield and Columbus, Ohio.



Update: Reaching those Incarcerated

On April 19 of this year, Media and Communications Services began airing Beyond Today television in United States prisons through the Edovo app. A total of 1,085 correctional facilities are now carrying our content on

Edovo is a non-profit organization providing educational, vocational and rehabilitative curriculums and content to incarcerated people. While the Church pays for this service, it is available at no cost to the incarcerated learners. More than 800,000 learners view content on the Edovo platform daily, and more than 35 million hours of content have been viewed.

Since April 19 our content has been watched in 1,085 different prisons, with 66,125 unique program starts and 44,835 unique program completions. So, 68 percent of the programs were viewed to the very end, which is a very good percentage.

The most-watched programs so far are (starts/completions):

Please pray that preaching the gospel of the Kingdom to those incarcerated in almost 1,000 prisons across the United States will have a positive impact on those persons' lives, and that the Father will call to salvation those whom He will.

Reminder: Watch Biblical Worldview Videos

Remember to join United Church of God president, Rick Shabi, as he discusses various topics focusing on the truth of the Bible, giving a biblical worldview on what is happening in our world.

These 10- to 15-minute videos are the Church's response to headlines you might see in the news, with the aim of reaching people outside our membership, and preaching a warning message, a message of repentance and a message of the gospel of the Kingdom of God to the nations.

The attendees were able to leave the hotel early on Friday, Oct. 25 and had to use transportation (cars or motorcycles) to reach a certain point where the road blocks began. Then they had to carry their bags on foot under a harsh sun, pass the blockade and take another transport on the other side to continue on their way. Having spoken by telephone with one of the strikers, we decided to get through in three cars filled with the elderly group that could not walk. It was a bit unsettling to arrive at the site and not know which of all the protesters to address. After being stopped several times and explaining the same thing, at the last stop it seemed that maybe they would not let us pass, but, suddenly a voice of another protester was heard shouting from far away: "they are authorized, let them pass."

Thus, we all achieved our goal of getting home safely. While it was an unusual and difficult trial, the consensus was that we managed to keep the faith that God was protecting us every step of the way. As Paul says in 2 Corinthians 5:7, "We walk by faith, not by sight."

We all rejoiced to prove once again that we are the children of the Almighty God who will take care of us in every Feast until His Kingdom comes.


New Zealand





Dan won dozens of awards working in technology and was admired and respected by his colleagues and employees alike, many of whom described Dan as the "best boss I ever had."



LifeNets Provides Accessible Van for Hoselton Family

The LifeNets (www.lifenets. org) team is thrilled to announce the successful delivery of a converted van for Faith Hoselton on Sept. 4, 2024. Our heartfelt gratitude goes out to everyone who has supported the Hoselton family through their many trials. Your contributions have made this project possible.

Faith Hoselton is 12 years old and has lived with spina bifida her entire life, which has left her wheelchair-bound. Despite numerous surgeries, traveling has become increasingly challenging as Faith has grown.

Her mother, Carole, is the primary caregiver and has

been lifting Faith in and out of the van since her birth. Each trip—whether to the doctor or the store—requires Carole to lift Faith out of her wheelchair and place her in the van, while also loading the wheelchair into the back. As the years pass, this task has become more physically demanding.

Brian, Faith's father, had been saving for an accessible van, but after a fire destroyed his business, he found himself out of work and unable to afford the necessary modifications. A reliable, accessible van would allow Faith to roll in and out without lifting, greatly easing the physical strain on Carole, who drives Faith to most appointments. LifeNets stepped in and solved the problem.

The Hoseltons have faced

Fuel and Fan the Feast Flame

Build on the spiritual foundation laid at the Feast and set some long-range goals.

We've been to the mountain top! Most of us were again blessed to be with other Church members to celebrate the Feast of Tabernacles. The Feast is a joyful highlight of the year for several reasons.

God intends that all of His annual feasts help fuel the fire of godly zeal. It should ignite within us good intentions that we will be more zealous than ever during the upcoming year. But coming back to wintertime (here in the northern hemisphere) and the not-so-exciting everyday routines is anticlimactic and it's easy to lose steam.


That's normal. That's human nature. Often when we human beings start out with good intentions and enthusiasm, we are naively overconfident. What tends to happen with any resolution or project is losing some of our interest and zeal. People let down, get sidetracked or even quit.

For example, at Mt. Sinai, the Israelites said, "All that the Lord has said we will do, and be obedient" (Exodus 24:7). However, we know how the people acted shortly after that!

God intends that all of His annual feasts help fuel the fire of godly zeal.

Furthermore, we know there will be increasing obstacles, temptations and persecution in this end time. Satan's evil influence is increasingly dominating our society. We must resist the many temptations and distractions.

When times are tough, let's be tough! Let's rise above our human nature and increasingly develop godly nature. Build on the spiritual foundation laid at the Feast and set some long-range goals. Make plans to fan the flames of passionate devotion to

God and keep those fires burning throughout the coming year.

Spiritual perseverance is a major theme in the Bible

God is highly aware of our weaknesses and the world's temptations, so His Word is full of admonishments for us to endure and persevere. And God is always by our side to help us whenever we ask for His help!

After Jesus warned of the increasing temptations and persecution in the end time, He said, "But he who endures to the end shall be saved" (Matthew 10:22; 24:13).

After Paul warned of the "wiles of the devil," He wrote, "Therefore take up the whole armor of God, that you may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand" (Ephesians 6:11, 13).

To Timothy, Paul wrote, "You therefore must endure hardship as a good soldier of Jesus Christ... If

we endure, we shall also reign with Him" (2 Timothy 2:3, 12).

The parable of the sower in Mark 4 illustrates several spiritual dangers. The seed "sown on stony ground [are those] who, when they hear the word, immediately receive it with gladness; and they have no root in themselves, and so endure only for a time. Afterward, when tribulation or persecution arises for the word's sake, immediately they stumble" (Mark 4:16-17). The seed "sown among thorns . . . are the ones who hear the word, and the cares of this world, the deceitfulness of riches, and the desires for other things entering in choke the word, and it becomes unfruitful" (Mark 4:18-19).

Then Mark 4:20 describes the result of seed sown on "good ground." They are those who persevere, grow and bear much good fruit! The "good ground" is the humble receptive mind of a disciple who is firmly dedicated to learn, grow, serve and remain forever faithful!

Theme of the Book of Hebrews: Perseverance

A major theme in the Bible is the necessity of spiritual perseverance and that is especially true in the book of Hebrews. The epistle of Hebrews was written primarily to those Jewish Christians long after their conversion. The author of this epistle (maybe Paul) had become aware that many of those Hebrew Christians were discouraged and letting down spiritually, sliding into lukewarm attitudes and actions like

the description of the church of the Laodiceans (Revelation 3:14-22).

Many were discouraged by their increasing trials, including persecutions. They were disappointed that Christ had not returned and were now having serious doubts. Many had come to think nostalgically of their lives in and around the Jerusalem temple with its impressive attractions.

They were tempted to think life was better under the Old Covenant and Judaism. To counter that thought, the word "better" is in the book of Hebrews 13 times! The point is emphatically made that everything that God and Christ offer us under the New Covenant is immensely better!

The book of Hebrews is brilliant writing and full of powerful reminders of how extremely blessed we are to be called by God to become converted children of God! This epistle was written to motivate those

Christians to rekindle the spiritual fire that they once had and rededicate their lives to Christ.

Probably the best two verses to sum up the message of Hebrews are Hebrews 10:35-36—"Therefore do not cast away your confidence, which has great reward. For you have need of endurance, so that after you have done the will of God, you may receive the promise."

The book of Hebrews is a priceless book for longtime Christians to occasionally review and meditate on!

The book of Hebrews is full of powerful reminders of how extremely blessed we are.


Persevere in spite of pressures and persecution

Paul wrote his last epistle from a prison cell to Timothy about how to spiritually survive and thrive even through adversities: "Yes, and all who desire to live godly in Christ Jesus will suffer persecution. But evil men and impostors will grow worse and worse, deceiving and being deceived. But you must continue in the things which you have learned and been assured of, knowing from whom you have learned them, and that from childhood you have known the Holy Scriptures, which are able to make you wise for salvation through faith which is in Christ Jesus. All Scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness, that the man of God may be complete, thoroughly equipped for every good work" (2 Timothy 3:12-17).

Let's keep what Paul wrote uppermost in our minds, "For I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory which shall be revealed in us" (Romans 8:18).

In today's societies, most people are lukewarm, cold or downright hostile toward biblical values! Don't let those negative influences or the weaknesses of our own human nature drag us down into lukewarm attitudes and temptations to let down!

God's Feast days have fueled and fanned the flames of our godly zeal! Let's be sure to persevere and keep that fire burning brightly this year and every year! GN

Pray More, Fast More, Take Godly Action!

Ezra and Nehemiah provide a powerful example of how to pray and fast.

Jesus said some things don't happen except by prayer and fasting (Matthew 17:21). It's easier to remember this in a challenging situation, but also a Christian must be praying and fasting regularly to live a spiritually strong life. We must fast more often than just on the Day of Atonement.

A powerful biblical example of prayer and fasting can be found in the lives of Ezra and Nehemiah. God's involvement and master timing were evident from when He "stirred up the spirit of Cyrus king of Persia" (Ezra 1:1) in 538 B.C. to decree that willing Jews should go to Jerusalem and "build the house of the LORD" (verse 3). The 70-year exile in Babylon was over.

Under the leadership of Zerubbabel and Joshua the high priest, encouraged by the prophesying of Haggai and Zechariah, the temple was completed ca. 516-515 B.C. Yet, Jerusalem and Judah were in dire need of spiritual rebuilding.

The Example of Ezra

So, in 457 B.C., Ezra, of the Aaronic priesthood, led 1,754 returning Jews, Benjamites and Levites on the roughly 900-mile four-month journey. (Note that not all of the 12 tribes were included in this journey as is often claimed [10:9].)

Ezra, whose name was short for Azariah meaning "Yahweh has helped," was "a skilled scribe in the Law of Moses" (7:6) who "had prepared his heart to seek the Law of the LORD, and to do it, and to teach statutes and ordinances in Israel" (verse 10). Doing and teaching! By Jesus' definition in Matthew 5:19, Ezra shall be called great in the Kingdom.

There are several important lessons we can learn about prayer and fasting from the example of Ezra.

Humility

"Humble ourselves before our God" (Ezra 8:21). This is surely a foundational requirement for prayer and fasting! "On this one will I look: on him who is poor and of a contrite spirit, and who trembles at My word" (Isaiah 66:2). Ezra inspired the people to also tremble at the words of God (Ezra 9:4).

To truly act with humility, we need to be open to God's guidance. Again, in Ezra 8:21, we see Ezra instructing the people to "seek from [God] the right way for us and our little ones and all our possessions."


In seeking God's way, it's not wrong to tell God our ideas. In Isaiah 1:18, God invites us to "reason together." Like a good parent, God is interested in our opinions and wants us to share all the details of our lives. But the key chapter in the Bible about fasting

(Isaiah 58) cautions in verse 4 that we must not try to "make your voice heard on high." God does not need us to be His counselor (Romans 11:34). The bottom line when praying or fasting, we must trust God the Father to know best and not lean on our own understanding (Proverbs 3:5).

Dependance on God

Another key is to recognize our total dependence on God and be receptive to His will. King Artaxerxes' letter to Ezra (7:11-26) indicates that he would have The Good News GN

been happy to provide a security escort, but in 8:22, we read that Ezra "was ashamed" to ask because he had boldly told the king in faith that God would protect them. In the following verses we learn that their gold and silver was estimated to weigh over 28 tons! (verse 26). Clearly, God had already provided for His people, and they were depending on Him to continue doing so.

Repentant Heart

When confronted by the leaders that the priests, Levites and people had not separated themselves from intermarriage with the peoples of the lands (9:1), first Ezra began fasting (verse 5). He prayed like Daniel, acknowledging his and his people's sins before God (verse 6). He praised God's righteousness for His mercy to His lowly remnant, too guilty to stand before Him (verse 15).

Fervency

Ezra prayed "confessing, weeping, and bowing down" (10:1). "The effective, fervent prayer of a righteous man avails much" (James 5:16).

Inspiration

God can answer through direct intervention but also through circumstances, inspiration or advice. Shechaniah spoke up, surely by God's inspiration, and forcefully told Ezra: "Arise, for this matter is your responsibility. We also are with you. Be of good courage, and do it" (Ezra 10:4).

God can answer prayers through direct intervention, circumstances, inspiration or advice.

Ezra pondered his advice, fasted some more and mourned for their guilt [remember the Beatitude that God will bless those who mourn with comfort (Matthew 5:4)]. Then Ezra took godly and timely action!

The Example of Nehemiah

In 444 B.C., while serving as King Artaxerxes' cupbearer, a civil service position demanding the utmost trust of the king, which archeology found in one case merited the fourth highest salary, Nehemiah learned from Hanani that the walls of Jerusalem were broken down and the gates burned with fire! (Nehemiah 1:2-3).

There are 11 recorded instances of Nehemiah praying, and it is clear that he fasted as well: "I was fasting and praying before the God of heaven" (verse 4). We can learn from his example as we did with Ezra's.

Heartfelt

Nehemiah "sat down and wept, and mourned for many days" (verse 4). No wonder his name means "Yahweh comforts." Like Ezra, Nehemiah poured his heart out!

Persistent

Nehemiah prayed to God about the situation day and night (like the persistent widow before the unrighteous judge in Luke 18:1-8). He began by not asking for anything for himself; rather, like in the Lord's Prayer, humbly hallowing God's name. He also confessed self and nation like Daniel did and reminded God of His promises to those who return to Him and do His will (Nehemiah 1:6-10).

Patient

We can follow his persistence with patience. Nehemiah waited four months! Faith is long-passioned. "Nehemiah did not ask in haste, but carefully bided his time, constantly praying to God to grant the proper opening" (Expositor's Bible Commentary). God is the Master Timer—we must let Him! When we sing "As for Me and My House" about "True blessings come in Your time, never early, never late," do we ever think they come early?

Tuned to God's Will

Nehemiah was in tune with God so that his prayer was according to His will. This is a step beyond just asking with no clue for God's will to be done.

One lesson from the Bible is that at times we may become the answer to our own prayer! Joseph said Egypt needed a man who could manage the famine and Pharaoh recognized that he was the man. Boaz called Naomi and Ruth blessed for coming to be redeemed, and he ended up no longer being "Ruthless." Nehemiah left his comfortable life in Persia where he was no doubt positioned by God so he could become His instrument to confront the problems in Jerusalem.

Silent Prayers Count Too

When the king saw him sad in his presence, which had never happened before, Nehemiah became "dreadfully afraid" (Nehemiah 2:2). Persian monarchs believed that just being in their presence ought to arouse great happiness. And Nehemiah was about to ask to exit stage south!

It's implied that Nehemiah prayed a silent prayer to God for the right words and favor (verse 4), as this happens in the middle of a conversation with the king. Silent prayers work, and in fact, God knows what we want to say even before we've actually formed the thought (Romans 8:26).

Prepared

Nehemiah had prepared! He was able to tell the king how long he planned to be gone and to ask for the permits he would need for travel and supplies. He had even searched out Asaph the keeper of the king's forest, so he had begun to make the necessary connections.

We must desire God's will and not our own, and accept it as He shows it, but why not still prepare for the reality that He might just say "YES!" right away!

Nehemiah boldly asked God to "let Your servant prosper this day" (Nehemiah 1:11). Though he had prayed and fasted for days, Nehemiah boldly still believed and asked God for an immediate answer to his prayer and fasting! We must desire God's will and not our own, and accept it as He shows it, but why not still prepare for the reality that He might just say "YES!" right away! (Hebrews 11:6). When we pray as Jesus instructed in Mark 11:23-24 without doubting for a mountainous problem to be cast into the sea, we should already hear the splash!

Remember, as James 2:22-24 teaches, faith without accompanying works is useless—dead!

Preparing for the coming of Jesus Christ

Judah had to be restored with a temple to set the stage for the first coming of the Messiah. The books of Ezra and Nehemiah, which the Hebrew canon counts as one book, provide inspiring lessons and parallels with the end-time work of building the New Testament spiritual "temple" of God, the Church—you and me—in preparation for Christ's second coming.

It's not ever going to be by our might or power, but by God's Spirit (Zechariah 4:6).

Let's pray more, fast more, and take godly action in faith! ${\color{red}\mathsf{GN}}$

Giving From Out of Our Abundance

What is within your heart and how will you give today?

Are you ready to give more of yourself? Giving more time, talents, gifts, knowledge, wisdom, kindness, goodness, mercy, joy, patience and love is the only way to go if you truly desire to be like Jesus Christ. His example is set before us to glean from, every time we choose to open up our Bibles to feast our eyes on the pages containing His life story.

What do you give? For some of us money is easy to give, while for others they hang on tightly to it, reluctant to part with any in case of need in an emergency situation, or wanting to grow their savings for "a rainy day." It is good to save for these times when things are lean or when we are in need (Proverbs 10:5). It is also good to share our blessings with brethren and the less fortunate including the poor (Hebrews 13:16). Is there any such thing as giving too much or too little? How much should we give? Should we have balance in giving? These questions have interesting answers and definitely involve wisdom from above. Let's look at an example in the Bible.

All That She Had

There's a woman mentioned in the book of Mark whose name we don't know, but whose actions we do. In Mark 12:42-43, it's recorded that she gave all the money she had, dutifully, willingly, faithfully to God. It wasn't much at all, just two copper coins. What could one buy with so little? There are people now, believe it or not, saying that this account had nothing to do with giving and it was really all about the Pharisees "ripping off" the widows! They did take advantage of these women, but that is not the primary or main focus. We need to recognize that despite her poverty she gave all she had even though it was minuscule . . . but it was certainly not minuscule to God and He commended her for it.

We could give everything we have to God, but if we are not living righteously this would be futile.

Since the account mentions that this woman was a widow, we know she had no husband to help her, and her poverty suggests she may also have had no children to help provide for her. This had a bearing on her selfless attitude in giving all the money she had. Hers was a complete sacrifice. Did she need to give it all away? Perhaps she considered herself blessed with everything she had and family provided for her physical needs? But what if she gave all she had, not knowing where her next meal came from? She may have been able to glean from the corners of the field each day to sustain herself. Much we do not know, but the one thing God wanted us to know is that she gave it all in faith. She humbly served God and not mam-

mon (money) as the scriptures refer to in Matthew 6:24 and Luke 16:13.

Now enter the rich where comparison is made to those who gave great amounts, so much more than she did. However, it was all relative. This means, by comparison, if we give from our abundance a small amount . . . is this really giving? We would not even miss it. There would be no hardship involved. Conversely, we are left to ponder whether the poor widow could afford any food the next day. What would she do? How would she survive? The widow gave everything she had . . . this is truly giving and it was a beautiful act of faith.

In contrast, the rich put in out of their abundance. They could have given more, but their choice was to give enough to make a loud indication that it was many coins. They wanted to attract the attention of others nearby hearing their money clink and clang rather impressively into the treasury. Jesus made special note of how the people gave and made a comparison between the wealthy and the poor for our instruction.

Motives Behind Giving

Some would say it is ludicrous to give everything you have, for how would you then live? It can be a hard thing to discern how much we should give. After all, Scripture shows that God desires obedience over sacrifice (1 Samuel 15:22). Some find obedience much harder to sustain than regular tithing or free will offerings. We can focus on being obedient by keeping the Ten Commandments, living daily lives that stay close to God and watching our personal state so that we do not enter into sin; and if we do, we immediately pray with repentance.

We could give everything we have to God, but if we are not living righteously this would be futile and meaningless, much like giving everything to the poor without love profits nothing (1 Corinthians 13:3). What would be best is to focus on obedience and pleasing God by showing love to others and filling needs when we see them. Yesterday it may have been trimming and filing the broken fingernails on an elderly man in an assisted living center that you may visit; today it may be giving your cardigan to a young person who is shivering with cold because she does not have one; tomorrow it may be visiting

someone who is unable to leave their home to give them your time, your conversation, your presence and company which could be the highlight of their lonely day. Perhaps you have even brought a healthy, hot, home-cooked meal for her to enjoy as she is no longer able to cook like she used to.

Giving brings joy to the recipient, and as it turns out, God will bless you too.

More than Money

Giving takes many forms. Giving all of ourselves involves more than merely money. If we are diligently giving tithes and offerings, that is all God asks of our finances. We can give more if we can and have the means to do so. But we can also give an offering of our time, our resources, our talents and gifts, and do so from a willing heart. If we see a need and have the capacity to do so, we should fill it.

God's Spirit will help lead you to do God's will in areas of giving. Giving brings joy to the recipient, and as it turns out, God will bless you, too, because you have been willing, instead of turning "a blind eye" or hardening your heart (Proverbs 11:25). We are told in 2 Corinthians 9:7 that God loves a cheerful giver. It is no good giving grudgingly as this is not truly giving (Deuteronomy 15:10). We need to examine our motives closely. We must give expecting nothing in return.

The example of the poor widow is a marvelous one, as who among us has truly given all the money they have at any time? We have been given from God such an abundance of blessings in talents, gifts and abilities along with financial benefits to be shared with those who have less. Everything we have is because of our Creator.

Our time is now to give to others in so many ways it would be impossible to remember and document all of them. Our Father is watching us just like Christ Jesus watched the poor widow in the temple 2,000 years ago to discern how we give, more so than the size of the gift (2 Corinthians 8:12). It truly is the motivation that counts. What is within your heart and how will you give today? God is watching to see how you are loving others in preparation for His Kingdom when further needs will be filled. **GN**

🔭 British Isles Camp ------

CAMP was held at Dalesdown in West Sussex from Aug. 4-11. The spacious central building allowed us to to unite in study, join for mealtimes and engage in pool, ping pong and many other activities. A separate sports hall and art room facilitated sports games and creative sessions, as well as valuable spiritual conversation. Fields containing a football pitch and a volleyball court were a focal point for competition between both adults and kids alike! The children stayed in bell tents which seemed to be the highlight for many in reconnecting after a year apart.

Support from adults including parents, grandparents and nine young leaders all contributed to a thriving environment for the 49 campers (aged 3-18) to learn and grow. We were joined by brethren from England, Italy, the Netherlands, Switzerland, Germany, Sweden, Australia and the United States, which brought our grand total to 98 members. We welcomed guests from congregations around the country to share in the Sabbath service and special music brought to us by the children's choir.

After breakfast each morning, David Elliot led a "thought of the day" followed by discussion groups. We then had age-related activity sessions, each led by an adult organizer and supported by the young leaders. Onsite activities included a summer fair featuring a very popular bouncy castle obstacle course, a multitude of sports games, arts and craft workshops, kite-making, music sessions, speed-puzzling, a karaoke evening and a rather rousing quiz!

The first of the offsite activities saw children and adults alike monkeying

around in the high-ropes at the "Out of Bounds" adventure course—with a competitive side of bowling. The latter part of the day was spent at Littlehampton Beach where group ball activities commenced, ice creams were eaten, and the brave even had a dip in the sea!

The second day out was spent paddle boarding and raft-building, which put teamwork skills to the test and succeeded in drawing out the adventurous spirit in all. The adults who volunteered as kitchen staff lovingly prepared sandwiches for the slightly soggy group, who enjoyed them by the lake.

On two occasions we shared an evening campfire and hymn sing—children kept calling for "one more hymn!" What a privilege to share in such enthusiasm for praise!

Strikingly apparent this year was the resounding spirit of unity among all age groups. Support, advice and encouragement were central to discussions about God, His way and His calling. Many poignant talks were held for the older teens, which benefited the adults who attended just as deeply.

The kitchen staff deserve a special mention as they worked tirelessly each day to provide wholesome and varied meals; from everyone at camp, we express our gratitude. A massive thank you is due to all the adults, parents and grandparents who volunteered their time and efforts in preparing such an inclusive space for joy that we were all so blessed to partake in.
