Are you a pilgrim? If the first thing that came to your mind was a group of English colonists who came to settle in the northeastern United States in 1620, or a group of travelers journeying to the Middle East to visit famous sites, you might not readily associate yourself with the term. However, we did, in fact, get to experience being a pilgrim quite recently, at this year's Feast of Tabernacles!

One of the ways to define the word "pilgrim" is "one who travels to a holy place" (Merriam Webster Dictionary). As we traveled to the Feast of Tabernacles and Eighth Day this year, we likely thought about the time when everyone will have the opportunity to experience this pilgrimage with us. "Many people shall come and say, 'Come, and let us go up to the mountain of the LORD, to the house of the God of Jacob; He will teach us His ways, and we shall walk in His paths" (Isaiah 2:3).

At the Feast this year, we learned a lot about what being a traveler means—for instance we live in temporary housing and have to leave behind our everyday lives and concerns. The United Church of God had 70 Feast sites (and 17 satellite sites) this year with a total of 13,577 brethren attending in person. California served the western time zones, connecting brethren registered for keeping the Feast at home.

A Legacy of Dedication and Vision in UCG Media

From the earliest days of the United Church of God, few individuals have left as enduring a mark on its media outreach as Peter Eddington. His steady leadership, creative vision and unwavering faithfulness have shaped the Church's media efforts in proclaiming the gospel of the Kingdom of God to the world.

Established on Pentecost 1995, the United Church of God began with its first headquarters in Arcadia, California, Almost immediately, the need for clear and consistent communication with members became evident. Within just a couple of months, Peter stepped forward to serve as editor for the Church's first publication, New Beginnings, which later became United News. In 1998, when the position for media operation manager opened, Peter was appointed to oversee UCG's growing media department-a role that would define his decades of service.

Early Days of the Media Department

Peter's work ethic quickly became well known. He was instrumental in developing nearly every aspect of UCG's media outreach—print, video and web, as well as advertising, both print and digital.

When the home office relocated from Arcadia to Milford, Ohio in 1998. Peter and his wife.

Terri, were among the few employees who made the move. The media department grew steadily, expanding its publishing team and seeking ways to promote Church materials.

The Church's early publishing efforts included *The Good News* magazine, with its first issue released for the Feast of Tabernacles in 1995. With the editorial efforts of Scott Ashley, Darris McNeely, Robin Webber and others, the magazine was soon accompanied by a growing library of booklets—including *Sunset to Sunset: God's Sabbath Rest, The Road to Eternal Life*, and *What Is Your Destiny?*

Within a couple of years, the *Bible Study Course* was launched, initially as 16-page inserts within *The Good News*. This effort filled a need for thorough educational materials in UCG's early days, covering important doctrines.

Due to limited funding, many of the first 10 booklets were completed but not immediately printed. Some booklets were distributed as inserts to save on postage, and when postal rates rose in 2002, the team shifted to a smaller 5.5 x 8.5-inch format to reduce costs.

As the Internet began to change the face of communication and advertising, it was important that the Church find a way to use this new tool. With technical assistance from Victor Kubik, UCG secured its first web domains, gnmagazine.org and ucg.org. Later, Aaron Booth joined the team to manage the Church's website.

Beyond Today and other UCG brands

As the Church's media ministry matured, a new chapter began with the introduction of television production. Local TV initiatives—such as those in Portland (led by Howard Davis, Randy Stiver and Rex Sexton) and Milwaukee (with Gary Petty, Galen Morrison, Darris McNeely and Steve Myers)—paved the way for what became UCG's current TV program: Beyond To-

day. The first program was aired on Dec. 18, 2005.

Under Peter's direction, Beyond Today grew into an international broadcast and digital brand. He oversaw the hiring of skilled video professionals helping to professionalize production quality and expand viewership. Later, Peter guided the alignment of *The Good News* magazine to the Beyond Today brand, uniting print and television outreach into one coordinated effort. The first magazine issue under the Beyond Today name was January-February 2016. Today, the name Good News is still found in a special section of *United News*, as well as remaining the name of the magazine in some international areas, such as Las Buenas Noticias for Spanish-speaking audiences.

as Google Ads, Roku and other digital platforms to reach wider audiences.

Peter's Legacy of Service

Those who have worked with Peter speak with deep admiration for his leadership.

Scott Ashley reflects, "Having worked for and with Peter in various capacities over nearly 28 years, I found him to be the best boss I ever had. He was an extraordinary talent with his ability to juggle so many things at once and stay on top of an ever-changing media environment. Throughout the years, the media department produced a variety of publications to serve a variety of needs of those coming to the truth for the first time and for members in different phases of their growth. World News and Prophecy, a publication started by Darris McNeely and Melvin Rhodes, later became a section within Beyond Today magazine. Vertical Thought magazine served Church teens and young adults until its successor, Compass Check, was launched in summer 2015 for readers aged 13-18. And more recently, we launched Magnified, a series of videos designed to address topics that are on the minds of young adults.

Initially, the Church's publications were promoted with print advertising, but as outreach expanded online, Peter proved instrumental in pioneering UCG's use of tools such

have watched and worked with Peter in the media operation almost from his start on the job. Peter built the program from the ground up. Employee by employee was added to the operation as we moved into the world of the Internet, video, print and everything. He had a vision of creating a website that was number one in biblical content. He produced *Beyond Today* with a technical efficiency that gave it a long shelf life.

"Peter has frequently quoted Mark 16:14-15 as the supporting verse for our media. 'Later He appeared to the eleven as they sat at the table; and He rebuked their unbelief and hardness of heart, because they did not believe those who had seen Him after He had risen. And He said to them, "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature."

"Peter oversaw the creation of a media presence that has

taken the gospel to the far-flung parts of the world. People in all the world have learned the truth of the Bible through UCG media efforts. Peter's legacy of being a 'good and faithful servant' allows others to continue to take the gospel of salvation to the world. It has been a highlight of my years to work with Peter in the work of God."

Aaron and Michelle Dean recalled: "Peter and Terri have been an integral part of the Church from the days in the 1980s when Michelle and I watched him doing technical work for the concerts at Ambassador Auditorium with great personal sacrifices of family time. Few know the sacrifice many have made for decades.

"That sacrifice continued since the beginning of UCG in 1995. He is a very talented manager with great technical skills that were very needed through UCG's development. He will now help pass the baton to Scott Delamater, as we continue to stay current with technology. Peter will always be a resource for UCG along with many of us who have given our lives to God."

Connie Seelig, who worked with Peter from 1995 until her retirement in 2022, shared about Peter, "I deeply appreciated his support and leadership. I will always remember his example of faithfulness and keeping his eyes on the Head of the Church, Jesus Christ, through the good times and difficult times. I know he will continue to serve the Church faithfully on the Council of Elders."



After serving as a satellite site in recent years, Walnut Creek, Ohio was designated as an official United States Feast location for 2025. Nestled in the heart of Amish country, the Feast of Tabernacles and Eighth Day were celebrated at Timbercrest Campground, a scenic setting surrounded by vibrant autumn foliage and the peaceful charm of the Ohio countryside.

Services took place in a spacious meeting tent equipped

with heated floor tiles and standing propane heaters—perfect for keeping everyone warm during the crisp fall mornings. Attendance reached a high of 239, nearly 100 more than previous years. Some Feast attendees camped on-site in tents or RVs, while others stayed in nearby hotels or rental homes.

Just outside the main tent, a long rectangular fire pit served as a central gathering spot where people cooked, sang and enjoyed fellowship together. As a fitting backdrop to this lively space stood a beautifully crafted Sukkot, built and decorated by the young adults with leaves gathered from the surrounding

This year's theme was "Feasting with Purpose: Creating a Better Future Now." Each day of the Feast highlighted a specific "better" concept, displayed on a whiteboard at the back of the hall. Attendees were invited to contribute their thoughts on how we can begin living out these "better" things today, even as we look forward to their ultimate fulfillment-better sacrifices, better promises, a better covenant, better hope, and a better resurrection. Throughout the Feast, several key ideas emerged on how to live out this theme: embracing God's provision and relying on Him, cultivating joy and gratitude, pursuing spiritual growth and transformation, and learning to serve and build community.

Although most of the Feast was blessed with beautiful weather, the first few days brought heavy rain. The downpour collected so much water on the meeting tent's canvas that it stretched beyond safe limits—requiring fire trucks to come and pump it out!

Despite the soggy start, the site's welcoming atmosphere and strong sense of community continued to attract newcomers, including those new to UCG or to keeping the Feast days. To help everyone fully enjoy the experience, several group meals were shared, and a refrigerated truck-affectionately called the "Deuteronomy Storehouse," inspired by Deuteronomy 14—was stocked with communal food that anyone could take and cook around the campfire.

A special highlight came when about 70 visitors from a nearby Feast-keeping group, made up of individuals from

Amish and Mennonite backgrounds, joined for a cookout potluck followed by a Q&A session with a panel of UCG elders.

It was truly a Feast filled with fellowship, food, and fun-featuring a (hay-free) hayride, talent show, karaoke, teen and young adult Bible studies, campfire gatherings, hymn singing, family day activities, fishing, crafting and more. The messages were inspiring, the music uplifting, and the con-



nections made were both meaningful and memorable.

Fasting God's Way: Lessons from Isaiah 58

Fasting is one of the most powerful tools in our Christian toolbox.

Whenever I fast, I always turn to Isaiah 58—the fasting chapter. Every time I do, verse 4 always catches my attention, with intrigue: "You will not fast as you do this day, to make your voice heard on high."

"But God, of course I'm fasting to spend special time talking with you, the POWER of the universe up there on your heavenly throne! I've got a special concern that I'd like you to know about and have your response."

When we fast, surely we hope God will listen to what we have to say!

In time, it occurred to me that this might be a scripture that I've been misunderstanding and should carefully study. Why is this so important to us who want to fast more effectively, especially on the Day of Atonement?

Fasting is one of the most powerful tools in our Christian toolbox, the others being prayer, Bible study, meditation and fellowship. Mark 9:29 says some things require fasting in addition to prayer.

In a recent Colorado Springs Sabbath service, a visiting pastor Nathan Ekama said that in his experience we don't fast as often as we should, especially for spiritual growth. Jesus said in Matthew 6:16-18 that His followers will fast and "your Father who sees in secret will reward you openly." God is eager to bless us for fasting! In my 55 years in the Church, I have experienced that!

Context is crucial

In Isaiah 58:1-2, His people "as [if] a nation that did righteousness, and did not forsake the ordinance of their God... take delight in approaching God." They were sinning! Yet they were baffled that God wasn't paying any attention to their fasts (verse 3). They were just going hungry and thirsty! It's just

as Isaiah confirms in his next chapter that "your iniquities have separated you from your God; and your sins have hidden His face from you, so that He will not hear" (59:2).

The Bible is replete with powerful examples of prayer and fasting that are heartfelt and passionate!

Could mistranslation be the problem? In bible-gateway.com where you can see a verse in all English translations, for Isaiah 58:4 they all agree the problem isn't in fasting to make your voice heard in heaven, but the wicked actions and attitudes expressed in verses 3 and 4. The New International Version is a representative example: "Yet on the day of your fasting, you do as you please [similar to God's complaint about their Sabbath keeping in Isaiah 58:13-14] and exploit all your workers. Your

fasting ends in quarreling and strife, and in striking each other with wicked fists. You cannot fast as you do today and expect your voice to be heard on high." But we can fast as Isaiah 58 directs, and God will be pleased to answer!

I was making the innocent blunder of leaving out the crucial qualifier "as you do this day."

Secondly, the word "make" is a problem word for me. We can't make God do anything and shouldn't be trying!

Jeff Foxworthy, the best-selling comedy recording artist of all time, tells a story about going on a group backpacking trip and hiring a guide. In a jam everybody turned on the guide, telling him he was all wrong and trying to enforce their conflicting ideas. This time Foxworthy wasn't telling a trademark redneck joke, such as: "If you've ever made change in the offering plate, you might be a redneck!" His heartfelt point was "Don't try to guide the Guide." In the video it looked like he was speaking to a religious audience about the Guide!

We should trust Jesus Christ, the head of the Church and each of us in our wilderness journey today, to guide us to the best place to camp and be our rear guard and then move as our pillar of cloud when it's time for us to move! (Exodus 13:21-22). How do we like our camp?

"Oh, the depth of the riches both of the wisdom and knowledge of God! How unsearchable are His judgments and His ways past finding out! 'For who has known the mind of the LORD? Or who has

become His counselor?" (Romans 11:33-34). "Our God is in heaven; He does whatever He pleases" (Psalm 115:3).


While "make your voice" conjures up ideas of trying to bully God, Strong's says "make your voice" is from the Hebrew *kole* meaning call aloud, cry out or yell. This is in line with James 5:16 which promises, "The effective, fervent prayer of a righteous man avails much" (James 5:16). The Bible is replete with powerful examples of prayer and fasting that are heartfelt and passionate!

Psalm 141:2 likens prayer to incense: Prayer should be beaten fine with a blend of ingredients (discuss everything with God); heated up (fervent); sweet and appealing to God ("He delights in every detail of their lives" [Psalm 37:23, New Living Translation]). This is the same way we parents delight in hearing from our kids!

Praiseworthy fasts in the Bible

In Ezra 8:21-23, note how Ezra sought God's protection. Not to make his voice heard on high. Not to cajole God into taking pity on them. No, so we can recognize our total dependence and be receptive to His will—"that we might humble ourselves before our God, to seek from Him the right way for us and our little ones and all our possessions."

When we face hard decisions about what to do, God can answer through circumstances, advice, inspiration, revelation or direct intervention.

God loves to hear the thoughts of His children who desire to bring their attitudes and actions in harmony with His.

In 2 Chronicles 20:1-12 Jehoshaphat confessed "nor do we know what to do but our eyes are upon You." Actually, he did know what to do: He called a nationwide fast and sought God's intervention of what would be best at the time and for all concerned!

It turns out that with Isaiah 58:4, as with other scriptures that baffle us, a little study of context and key words clears up the issue. We should not fast while sinning with evil actions and attitudes. We should fast fervently, expecting God the Master Timer to make it effective and "avail much."—but never trying to guide the Guide, tell Him what to do or bend His will to ours.

God wants us to fast and pray and humbly look to Him and submit to His will. He loves to hear the thoughts of His children who desire to bring their attitudes and actions in harmony with His.

When we follow what Isaiah 58 teaches about fasting—what pleases God and what doesn't—verse 9 promises, "Then you shall call, and the Lord will answer; you shall cry, and He will say, 'Here I am." GN

Deism Versus Biblical Truth

Much of modern Christianity today is being gradually destroyed from within by Deism.

The false teachings of Deism have returned with a vengeance.

Deism is a pseudo belief in the existence of God. Its proponents admit that the creation demands the existence of a creator, but not necessarily a personal or comprehendible God who intervenes in the affairs of men. Deism is solely based on rational thought without any reliance on revealed religions or religious authority. It emphasizes the concept of natural theology—that is, God's existence is revealed through nature and observation.

A German priest, theologian, author, hymnwriter and Augustinian friar named Martin Luther publicly protested the corruption, vile practices and teachings of the Roman Catholic Church. In 1517 he posted and circulated his "Ninety-five Theses or Disputation on the Power and Efficacy of Indulgences." Luther's teachings spread across Europe, resulting in the division of Western Christendom between Roman Catholicism and the new Protestant traditions, mainly Lutheranism, Calvinism, Anglicanism and Anabaptists. A by-product of the fissure in Christianity was another philosophy taking hold in Europe—the Age of Enlightenment. Also known as the Age of Reason, it was an intellectual and philosophical movement in Europe from the late 17th century to the early 19th century. At its foundation, the Enlightenment rejected religion—meaning primarily the Roman Catholic Church, but also gradually including the Protestant churches. There are over one hundred famous authors and philosophers from that period. Famous among them are Voltaire, Rousseau, Descartes and Francis Bacon. For Martin Luther, as for Bacon or Descartes, the way to truth lay in the application of human reason.

This philosophy, which many historians consider an expansion of the teachings of Socrates and Aristot-

le, rejected religious texts and appealed only to truths that they felt could be established by reason and observation. Such philosophers and theologians were called "deists," and the philosophical and theological position they advocated is called "Deism." Thomas Jefferson, Benjamin Franklin, James Madison and James Monroe are today considered to have been deists. They believed in a rational God but often rejected traditional Christian doctrines.

The concepts of Enlightenment have been infiltrating "Christian" churches for a generation. Known as "deconstruction," this movement has as its primary objective the reconciliation of one's personal views with their changing religious beliefs. Each believer can fashion his faith as a mixture of teachings he chooses. As one becomes more comfortable rejecting God's Word, deconstruction results in disconnection from a traditional biblical Christian worldview. Ultimately, each step in the process draws one farther and farther away from the God of the Bible.

BcWorldview.org author Jeff Hines recently published, "... those who once promoted Christian deconstruction are now turning to other words in order to repaint a more positive picture of the process ... The term 'deconstruction' is being relabeled in the Christian community and, therefore, beginning to be replaced by words such as 'rearranging' or 'recommitment' regarding one's theological underpinnings." The message is to blend or adapt religious teachings to one's own preferences. Hines added, "deconstructionists have landed in the fringes of Christianity, where anything goes and inclusiveness of a broad range of twisted theology has become part of the movement . . . Deconstruction means choosing easier beliefs . . . [and it] almost always means adopting views palatable to the unbelieving world. All too conveniently, it means moving away from positions on sexuality, gender, salvation, sin, hell, and other issues not embraced by popular culture."

The destructive force of Deism can be seen by the demise of the Anglican Church—the once powerful Church of England that is now an empty shell. Much of modern Christianity today is being gradually destroyed from within by Deism. The "health and wealth" gospel and "cheap grace" ideas are cases in point. When people use feelings or personal desires as their authority, the result is often lonely. By establishing the broad "accept everyone and their standards" idea they soon conform to their own view of what is truth, moral and right, rather than God's teachings. It involves replacing the God of the Bible with a false god based on what mankind feels he should think and believe. It means rejecting entirely or picking only small parts of the Bible to believe.

The false teachings of Deism have returned with a vengeance. A large portion of churchgoers under age 40 have adopted this blending of truth and error. No surprise. God inspired the apostle Peter to write about our time, "But there were also false prophets among the people, even as there will be false teachers among you, who will secretly bring in destructive heresies, even denying the Lord who bought them, and bring on themselves swift destruction. And many will follow their destructive ways, because of whom the way of truth will be blasphemed. By covetousness they will exploit you with deceptive words; for a long time their judgment has not been idle, and their destruction does not slumber" (2 Peter 2:1-3).

Jesus taught us, "And you shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free" (John 8:32). Rejecting truth and replacing it with human reason always results in a type of slavery. That's why we must be on guard against modern Deism. **GN**

Humanity

The first chapter of the Holy Bible reveals that God created men and women in His image and likeness (Genesis 1:26-27). The context of this fact is important to understand.

Nearly 6,000 years ago, God prepared this world for human habitation during a single week, as explained in Genesis 1. In the several days prior to man's creation, God made different forms of life, each of which was to reproduce "according to its kind" (Genesis 1:11-12, 21-25).

This principle rules out evolution as commonly understood—the idea that creatures evolved from one kind into another. (God designed the genetic code to allow limited changes within kinds, but not from one kind to another.)

After repeatedly stating that creatures were to reproduce according to their kind, God said He would make man in His own image and likeness (again, Genesis 1:26-27). The clear implication is that man was created according to the "God kind," so to speak, with God intending to reproduce Himself through human beings. In fact, Genesis 5:1-3 compares God having made Adam, the first man, in His own likeness to when "Adam begot a son in his own likeness, after his image, and named him Seth."

Humanity was, therefore, created with a truly amazing potential. The future of humanity, as explained elsewhere in Scripture, is to be children in the family of God (1 John 3:1-2; 2 Peter 1:4; 2 Corinthians 6:18). Yet human beings, as physical flesh-and-blood creatures, have initially been formed on a much lower level than God.

As first created, the "likeness" to God in man is quite restricted—limited to such areas as general resemblance in form, feelings, thought, creative abilities and the capacity to govern—all in a rather inferior sense as compared to God. However, God intends for man to ultimately come to share His divine glory, power, intelligence, wisdom and righteous, loving character.

The character of Almighty God is perfect. He is inherently good and cannot sin. This is also what God desires for His children. Yet even God, who is all-powerful, does not create perfect character in human beings by simply willing that result. The development of righteous character requires a conscious decision by a being with free will to conduct his or her life based on knowledge of what is morally right and wrong, choosing what is right and rejecting what is wrong.

Again, when initially created our first human parents, Adam and Eve, received a life of physical, fleshly existence of limited duration. "And the Lord God formed man of the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living being" (Genesis 2:7).

The Hebrew word *nephesh*, translated "being" in Genesis 2:7 (or "soul" in the King James Version), is used in the first chapter of Genesis four times in connection with animals (Genesis 1:20-30) and is translated as "body" in the phrase "dead body" in Numbers 6:6. The first man was later told, "In the sweat of your face you shall eat bread till you return to the ground, for out of it you were taken; for dust you are, and to dust you shall return" (Genesis 3:19).

We believe that humanity was created in the image of God with the potential to become children of God, partakers of the divine nature. God formed humanity of flesh, which is material substance. Human beings live by the breath of life, are mortal, subject to corruption and decay, without eternal life, except as the gift of God under God's terms and conditions as expressed in the Bible. We believe that God placed before Adam and Eve the choice of eternal life through obedience to God or death through sin. Adam and Eve yielded to temptation and disobeyed God. As a result, sin entered the world and, through sin, death. Death now reigns over all humanity because all have sinned (Genesis 1:26; 2 Peter 1:4; Hebrews 9:27; 1 Corinthians 15:22; Romans 5:12; 6:23).

The biblical book of wisdom known as Ecclesiastes contains this exhortation: "Whatever your hand finds to do, do it with your might; for there is no work or device or knowledge or wisdom in the grave where you are going" (Ecclesiastes 9:10; see also verse 5). So there is no consciousness in death, which is compared elsewhere in Scripture to sleeping in total unawareness (see, for example, John 11:11-14; 1 Corinthians 11:30; 15:51; 1 Thessalonians 4:13-14).

Human beings are mortal, subject to corruption and decay. They do not possess immortality in the form of an "immortal soul." Rather, they start out without eternal life. A biblical prayer declares: "What profit is there in my blood, when I go down to the pit? Will the dust praise You? Will it declare Your truth?" (Psalm 30:9). Another states, "For in death there is no remembrance of You; in the grave who will give You thanks?" (Psalm 6:5).

Human beings do have a spiritual component to their initial makeup—the human spirit (Job 32:8; Zechariah 12:1). It is this spirit that imparts intellect to the physical human brain, thereby giving the human mind abilities far beyond other physical creatures: "For what man knows the things of a man except the spirit of the man which is in him?" (1 Corinthians 2:11).

Unconscious of itself apart from the body, this spirit returns to God at death (Ecclesiastes 12:7). In the future resurrection, God will place the spirits of those who have died into new bodies, returning them to conscious intelligence with their personalities and memories intact.

As initially formed, human beings are incomplete creations. God wants to share with them His very nature and enable them to become His literal spiritual children. This is only possible by His Holy Spirit joining with each person's human spirit (Romans 8:16). This gives higher, godly understanding and imparts God's character of love (1 Corinthians 2:10-16; Romans 5:5). It is through the Holy Spirit that God will transform us into beings who will, when resurrected or changed at Christ's return, live with Him forever (Romans 8:11).

God desires to give to every human being the gift of eternal life as a member of His family. Eternal life is not something a person can earn. However, God will not grant this precious gift to anyone who does not yield to Him and His law (1 Corinthians 6:9-10).

In the Bible, eternal life in the family of God is called salvation, for those given immortality in that family will never again be subject to death. God reveals to us, through the divinely inspired Scriptures, that salvation is not automatically granted to every human being. He will bestow this blessing on only those who have proven their willingness to obey Him (Revelation 21:7-8).

God was not obligated to elevate human beings to eternal life with Him in the spirit realm, but we know that God is love (1 John 4:8). Therefore, out of unselfish, outgoing concern, He has devised a plan whereby we can be given salvation, the greatest possible blessing a loving Creator can bestow (Luke 12:32).

When God created Adam and Eve, He gave them access to the tree of life, symbolic of eternal life (Genesis 2:9; 3:22). And He commanded them not to eat the fruit of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, which was symbolic of choosing, apart from God, to determine right and wrong for oneself. But they disobeyed God's command, which constitutes sin or lawlessness (1 John 3:4). And sin leads to death (Genesis 2:17; Ezekiel 18:4, 20; Romans 6:23). Every sin damages the character of the one who commits it. To commit sin harms both the individual sinner and society in general.

Adam and Eve, like all human beings, were given freedom of choice, and under the influence of Satan they violated God's explicit command (Genesis 3:1-6). The first human beings thus began to live in a manner contrary to the will of their loving Creator, placing themselves under the penalty of death, about which God had warned them in advance. No human being except Jesus Christ, the Son of God, has lived a sinless life (Ecclesiastes 7:20; Romans 3:23; Hebrews 4:15).

In spite of human sinfulness, God's ultimate plan for humankind has not been thwarted. In His omniscient wisdom and mercy, God has provided a means by which human beings can be reconciled to Him (John 3:16-17). People can still develop the godly character that is a prerequisite to receiving God's most precious gift of eternal life as His children (1 Corinthians 15:22; Galatians 2:20). But apart from the deliverance God has provided, death reigns over all humanity because all have sinned (Romans 5:12).

God desires harmonious relationships—both between human beings and Himself and among human beings, between individuals and groups. Again, God is in the process of establishing His great family, which the physical human family is to portray. We also see this in the sacred institution of marriage. In creating Adam, God said it was not good for him to be alone (Genesis 2:18). Man needed companionship. So God made woman and established marriage (Genesis 2:21-25)—a covenant partnership between a man and a woman and with God (Matthew 19:4-6; Malachi 2:14).

The marriage relationship was intended to model the relationship that Jesus Christ would eventually have with the Church of God (Ephesians 5:22-23). And God also stated that husband and wife are made "one" to produce godly offspring (Malachi 2:15). Marriage is a very serious commitment, safeguarded in the law of God. **GN**

Spiritual Fellowship: An Essential Vitamin

According to the Cleveland Clinic, about one billion people worldwide are deficient in Vitamin D. This deficiency weakens bone and muscle health and often leads to low mood and fatigue. However, with simple changes in diet and everyday habits, it is preventable and treatable.

In a similar way, we can neglect another essential "vitamin" needed to support and maintain our spiritual health: fellowship. When it's lacking, we too can experience discouragement and spiritual fatigue over time.

Let's explore why fellowship is so vital, how the Bible highlights its benefits, and practical ways to strengthen it in our daily lives.

Identifying Obstacles

Meeting together is not always convenient. Hundreds of members live far away from their congregation, requiring hours of driving each Sabbath. Others face financial struggles that make it difficult to travel. Personal hardships such as illness, exhaustion, caregiving responsibilities, or the weight of ongoing trials can discourage us from making a consistent effort to see one another.

Yet while these obstacles are real, they don't lessen the importance of fellowship. Just as a body still needs nourishment when appetite is low, our spiritual lives still require the

"nutrient" of fellowship to stay strong. Without it, weakness and discouragement can set in, just as surely as a vitamin deficiency affects the body over time.

However, we were not meant to be alone for extended periods. Prolonged isolation can harm our mental, physical, and most importantly, our spiritual health. God designed us to be social, and that design is for our great benefit.

Fellowship provides comfort, consolation, joy, and at times, honest feedback and correction. In James 5:13–16 we read, "Is anyone among you suffering? Let him pray. Is anyone cheerful? Let him sing psalms. Is anyone among you sick? Let him call for the elders of the church, and let them pray over him... Confess your

trespasses to one another, and pray for one another, that you may be healed. The effective, fervent prayer of a righteous man avails much."

Even when we do not feel like congregating and meeting together due to inconvenience or lowliness of spirit, God has placed us within a spiritual family. Fellowship is one of the essential nutrients He pro-

vides to sustain our healing, growth and endurance.

Just as there are many ways to nour-



1 Corinthians 12:18-20 reminds us that "God has set the members, each one of them, in the body just as He pleased. And if they were all one member, where would the body be? But now indeed there are many members, yet one body."

Fellowship is an essential vitamin for our spiritual lives—it sustains us, encourages us and keeps us standing strong together. It strengthens the "bones" of the spiritual body and revitalizes each limb so that we can function

in harmony. And in tough times, it provides support to any part that may need an extra boost of encouragement.



Hebrews 10:24-25 tells us to "Consider one another in order to stir up love and good works, not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as is the manner of some, but exhorting one another, and so much the more as you see the Day approaching."

The Feast of Tabernacles beautifully exemplifies the wonderful opportunity to reap the full benefits of fellowship in a short period. United Youth Camps 2025: Reports /____



Camp Benin ------

THE coastal town of Grand-Popo, Benin hosted our youth camp from July 27 to Aug. 3, 2025, bringing together 21 teenagers from Benin, Côte d'Ivoire and Togo under the theme "Building on the Foundation" (1 Corinthians 3:11).

Local elder Pierre Ogoudele directed the camp alongside his wife Rose, with Werner Solórzano from the Home Office and two U.S. volunteers: Joanna Bradford and her son Bill Bradford. Days began at 6 a.m. with calisthenics, followed by a structured schedule that included morning interactive Bible studies, English classes and several rotating activities: volleyball, baseball, archery, swimming lessons, rugby and workshop sessions where participants made bracelets and keychains. Thursday and Friday featured competitions and skills testing across all sport activities.

Post-camp evaluation showed improvements in participants' spiritual commit-

ment and behavior. As Mr. Ogoudele noted in his follow-up report, the camp is "a powerful transformation tool for our youth," since the structured program strengthens their relationship with God and builds lasting connections with like-minded teens from the region as they navigate their challenges as young people in West Africa.

The camp concluded Saturday evening with a campfire where there was dancing, singing and humor. All participants received medals and merit certificates were awarded to those who excelled in the various sports competitions.

This youth camp provides regional teenagers a place to gather, develop skills and grow in their faith. The local team's commitment and the program's impact make this an important investment in West African youth.
