



'No Jews in our hotel': Israeli family denied access to Bavarian hotel

June 4, 2026 Jerusalem Post reported: "An Israeli family who attempted to book a room at a hotel in Bavaria, Germany, received a message through Booking.com saying, "Sorry, there are no Jews allowed in our hotel."

The family received the message on June 2 from Hotel Zum Hirschen, a 120-year-old family establishment in the Bavarian town of Lam, on the border with the Czech Republic.

After the family filed a complaint, the hotel was removed from Booking.com. The Upper Palatinate Police Headquarters said the Regensburg Criminal Police have opened an investigation.

The hotel has since issued an apology. It claimed it has been dealing for a while with fraudulent bookings and phishing attempts through Booking.com, and falsely assumed the booking request from Israel was one of these. According to German journalist Tobias Huch, the hotel wrote directly to the family, apologized, and provided evidence of previous phishing incidents.

"This was nevertheless unacceptable and must not happen in a professional establishment," he quoted the hotel as saying. "We and our employees are only human, and sometimes anger gets the better of us..."

The world could be on the brink of a "Godzilla-like" El Niño extreme weather pattern that could trigger economic and political disruption around the world.

El Niño, an oceanic heatwave that occurs two to three times each decade, is building in the Pacific around the equator, and is expected to peak in September, the United Nations' World Meteorological Organization (WMO) has warned.

The warm current will affect weather patterns and increase the risk of droughts in Australia, and southern parts of Asia and Africa. It will also increase the likelihood of violent storms and heavy rainfall in parts of the Americas.

While droughts and storms are bad enough, experts say this could be the strongest El Niño on record, with even more severe potential outcomes. These include flooding, landslides, wildfires, famine, conflict and migration.

The expected severity has led to some meteorologists using the term Godzilla El Niño – after the colossal dinosaur-like creature that has featured in dozens of monster films. El Niño has been causing weather-related disasters for centuries. It is thought to have contributed to the collapse of Peru's ancient Moche civilization in the eighth century, for example..."

Arkansas Governor Sarah Sanders unveils VERY Christian alternative to Pride Month

June 2, 2026 dailymail.com reported: "The governor of Arkansas has declared June 'Fidelity Month' instead of Pride Month, urging Americans to instead 'rededicate themselves to God.'

Republican Gov. Sarah Huckabee Sanders proclaimed this week that June 2026 would be recognized as 'Fidelity Month' in Arkansas, but stopped short of confirming whether the designation was meant to counter Pride Month.

'Here in Arkansas, June is Fidelity Month: fidelity to family, fidelity to country, fidelity to God,' she said during an interview with Daily Wire.

Pride Month, first recognized at the federal level in 1999 by former President Bill Clinton, kicked off Monday with celebrations of LGBTQ+ culture, history and achievements. But in the proclamation, which focused heavily on Christian values, Sanders said: 'Practices that encourage virtue, commitment, responsibility and shared moral foundations strengthen both individuals and their communities.'

'Call the outrage police': College student reports peer for using term 'mothers' instead of 'lactating individuals'

June 1, 2026 World Net Daily reported: "A recent "bias report" out of the University of Minnesota included a student's complaint that the apparently triggering term "mothers" had been used in campus grant proposals, as opposed to the more inclusive phrase "lactating individuals."

The complaint was one of several that were lodged via the university's "Bias Response and Referral Network," as reported at the College Fix.

"Lactating individual" is one of the many terms spawned from the transgender movement as a means to include women. Three of the 100 reports of bias between July 2024 and March 2026 referenced the same offender, who was either a graduate student or professor. The College Fix reported that a graduate student reported the anonymous writer for using the offensive language despite it being "fixed" after the initial faux pas..."

Random Standard Wi-Fi Routers Can Scan Your Body to Identify Exactly Who You Are

May 31, 2026 futurism.com reported: "If you were paranoid about digital tracking before, you might want to think twice about reading any further.

New research out of Germany's Karlsruhe Institute of Technology found that the types of Wi-Fi routers we all have in our homes come with a major privacy vulnerability that can be used to identify any human body that comes within their range.

The study, flagged by *Gizmodo*, used machine learning systems to identify individuals with an accuracy rate of 99.5 percent. To do so, the researchers exploited a vulnerability in a process known as beamforming feedback information (BFI), which was introduced to allow routers to focus Wi-Fi signals on connected devices, as opposed to the older approach, which is to blanket an entire area in coverage.

While BFI is great for network connectivity, it has a major downside for privacy. For starters, devices connected to a router using beamforming need to send constant feedback in order to be found. As routers send out and receive network feedback, the signal is inevitably impacted by real world factors like pets, walls, and people.

That gap, between the signals routers expect to receive and the distorted feedback they actually get, allowed researchers to extrapolate the identities of 161 individual participants based on BFI data which inadvertently mapped their physical characteristics. Even when individuals changed their gait or carried objects like backpacks and crates, the system registered an accuracy rate between 50 to 60 percent, the KIT team wrote..."

Ebola Cases In DR Congo And Uganda

May 31, 2026 Agence France Presse reported: More than 1,100 people were suspected of having contracted Ebola in the Democratic Republic of Congo and neighbouring Uganda, the head of the African Union's health agency said on Sunday in a commentary for the Financial Times.

Africa Centres for Disease Control and Prevention director general Jean Kaseya said there were 263 confirmed cases in both countries as of Saturday, with 43 confirmed deaths.

More than 1,100 suspected cases were still being investigated, he wrote in the editorial. On Thursday, the Africa CDC said there had been 246 suspected deaths from the virus.

"We must move at the speed of the epidemic," added Kaseya, criticising Africa's dependence on outside financial support. The health ministers of the DR Congo, Uganda and South Sudan recently adopted a \$319-million response plan to the outbreak. "That momentum must now expand across the continent," Kaseya said, calling the latest Ebola outbreak a "serious test" for the Africa CDC and the African Union. "This outbreak will not be the last," he added..."

The outbreak was declared on May 15 in Ituri, in the northeast DR Congo, which is home to more than 100 million people and is one of the poorest countries in the world. The virus, which can cause a deadly haemorrhagic fever, has been detected in three Congolese provinces as well as in Uganda..."
