Life Lessons: Four Warnings about Stubbornness

There is an old legend that has been retold in many ways about a battleship sailing in heavy fog. The captain was concerned because they had lost contact with the other ships in the fleet and he feared a collision.



A lookout reported a light in the distance and the captain sent a message for the other ship to change course. He is shocked when he received a message back for their ship to change course.

The captain was infuriated and fired back a message that read, "I am a captain. Change your course." They immediately received a reply, "I am a midshipman. Change your course."

The captain decided that the threat of force was the only action left to him. He had the signal man send, "I am a battleship. Change your course." What came back was, "I am a lighthouse."

The ability to stand up for what is right is an admirable character trait. It takes faith and courage to do what is right in the face of opposition or persecution. This is good.

It is important to know the difference between standing your ground for what is right and selfish stubbornness. Sometimes we can be so stubbornly set on a course that we ignore the signs that we are headed for a shipwreck.

Points to build on

1. Just because something seems right to us doesn't make it right to God.

Proverbs 14:12: "There is a way that seems right to man, But its end is the way of death."

This is a hard lesson for those who think "let my conscience be my guide." What we think and feel must come into compliance with God's instructions or we can believe we are being courageous when we are just being stubborn.

2. A person who reveres God is quick to seek God's guidance and respond in humble obedience. When we "harden our hearts" in stubbornness we will face calamity.

Proverbs 28:14: "Happy is the man who is always reverent, But he who hardens his heart will fall into calamity."

3. A stubborn person holds his own opinion in such high regard that he won't listen to even the wisest advice.

Proverbs 29:1: "He who is often rebuked, and hardens his neck, Will suddenly be destroyed, and that without remedy."

4. Stubbornness is the result of pride and arrogance.

Proverbs 8:13: "The fear of the LORD is to hate evil; Pride and arrogance and the evil way and the perverse mouth I hate (God talking)."

Application

When Israel's King Saul rejected God's guidance the prophet Samuel was sent with a message to the king. He told Saul, "For rebellion is as the sin of witchcraft, And stubbornness is as iniquity and idolatry."

It takes courage and strength of character to stand your ground when it is the right thing to do. But when we stubbornly resist what is right because we hold our own opinion in high esteem we have made ourselves a god. We become idolaters.

The next time you find yourself sure of your position and angrily headed towards confrontation take a step back and compare your ideas with the Bible. You may find that you are about to run your ship aground.

Personal From the President...

Dear fellow servants of God,

The death of a child is one of the most painful experiences for a family to endure. The pain stabs friends and community as well. We all hurt as our faith is challenged and even temporarily paralyzed as we sort through the tragedy of a loved one who is now gone from this life.

Today, we all as family and friends of various fellowships came together for the memorial of two-year-old Chloe Aschenbrenner of the Cincinnati, Ohio, area. At the home office we all work closely daily with her grandparents, Gerald and Connie Seelig, whom we love dearly.

It is hard to know what to say when an untimely death occurs. The Apostle Paul did, however, offer these words about this uncomfortable subject to the fledgling church in Thessalonica: "But I do not want you to be ignorant, brethren, concerning those who have fallen asleep, lest you sorrow as others who have no hope" (1 Thessalonians 4:13).

Paul acknowledged sorrow and grief. But we are not to sorrow like those who have no hope--those who do not have a relationship with our Lifegiver God. He went on to speak about the resurrection of the dead.

Our bedrock faith is defined by our daily prayer of "Thy Kingdom Come." This frames our existence on this earth and life to come. This is our hope.

At this time of coming together for the family, we will remember Chloe. We are with the family in spirit. We grieve. But we also have hope in the teaching of the glorious Kingdom that gives life and we hold on tight to our relationship with our Father and His Son, Jesus Christ.

We do need to pray for one another and hope that God will use us in His way to offer love and support to those

who suffer in their time of need.

In our prayers, let us pray for God's grace and His comfort upon the many in our midst who are dealing with the impact of unexpected trials. There are other families who have children with serious health trials. Some of the names are Olivia Greider, Samara Brock, Faith Hoselton. Let us remember these, and the many others who need our prayers and support. We "have the same care for one another... if one member suffers, all the members suffer with it" (1 Corinthians 1:25-26).

Pray for God's grace, comfort and healing. "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies and God of all comfort, who comforts us in all our tribulation, that we may be able to comfort those who are in any trouble, with the comfort with which we ourselves are comforted by God" (2 Corinthians 1:3-4).

Paul wrote these encouraging words of faith to help us understand the purpose of our trials. "For I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory which shall be revealed in us. For the earnest expectation of the creation eagerly waits for the revealing of the sons of God. For the creation was subjected to futility, not willingly, but because of Him who subjected it in hope; because the creation itself also will be delivered from the bondage of corruption into the glorious liberty of the children of God. For we know that the whole creation groans and labors with birth pangs together until now. Not only that, but we also who have the firstfruits of the Spirit, even we ourselves groan within ourselves, eagerly waiting for the adoption, the redemption of our body. For we were saved in this hope, but hope that is seen is not hope; for why does one still hope for what he sees? But if we hope for what we do not see, we eagerly wait for it with perseverance" (Romans 8:18-25).

We are firstfruits to God and to the Lamb. Those who endure to the end will have been tested and tried. God promises to make us sons in His image and co-heirs with Christ in eternity. It is the awesome mind-bending reality promised to us.

Let us take heart and courage from these words and let us remember each other in prayer.

Report from France and French-speaking Africa

After observing the Sabbath on March 17 and preaching in our congregation in Bordeaux, France, I flew to Abidjan, Cote d'Ivoire, where I helped our regional pastor based in Cameroon, Moïse Mabout, kick off our annual West African youth camp. We had 22 campers in attendance.

During this trip, we also began construction to enlarge and add plumbing and electricity to our church building in La Mé (about one hour north of Abidjan).

Also during this trip, we visited our congregation near Man, Cote d'Ivoire, which is 550 kilometers north of Abidjan. We have a basic mud-brick church hall in Blolé where our 20-person congregation meets. We have a deacon, Mamadou Tokpa, who oversees the congregation. His home and the church building are the most beautifully-maintained structures in the mostly Muslim village. I conducted a Bible study, and we walked through the village meeting friends and neighbors and visited the main farming areas where our members work.

We returned to Abidjan, where I preached on the Sabbath of March 24 and spent time with the campers and then caught the overnight flight back to Paris that evening. I went on to Bordeaux early Sunday morning where I joined my wife, Maryse, who had arrived from the U.S. a few days earlier.

For the Passover, Night to Be Much Observed, and the First Day of Unleavened Bread, we rented a five-bedroom house outside of Bordeaux and French brethren drove in from around the country to spend the days together. We had 19

people for Passover. It was a very special weekend celebrating God's Holy Days together. We also took advantage of the Sunday after the First Day of Unleavened Bread for interactive discussions of core Biblical prophetic teachings where I presented three two-hour interactive seminars.

After returning to Bordeaux, Maryse, Jessica Hendrickson and I left for Cotonou, Benin, where we visited our congregation and where I preached on the Last Day of Unleavened Bread and the Sabbath. Our Lomé, Togo, pastor, Kossi Fiaboé, made the 100-mile journey to Cotonou and Moïse Mabout and his wife, Berthe, joined us. Because we are not able to have an ordained elder present for the Feast of Tabernacles, we took this opportunity to conduct a special blessing of little children ceremony and we enjoyed fellowship together at our rented open-air room and visited at the home of a deacon who suffered a stroke last year and is unable to attend services. Maryse and I also held meetings with Mr. Fiaboé and Mr. Mabout on pastoral matters and feast and youth camp planning.

On Sunday evening, April 9, we took a return overnight flight to Paris and Bordeaux and left the following Tuesday morning for Evian-les-Bains, the location of our Feast site for 2018. This year's feast in France will be the largest in United's history and we held meetings with the site director and staff to work through details of planned events. We observed the Sabbath with a Sabbath-keeping group in Lyon led by Jérémy and Elodie Féro who have observed the Feast with us for the past couple of years. They hosted us in their home, which provided a nice chance for fellowship.

Maryse and I wrapped up our trip with a visit to the German office in Bonn where we met with Jesmina Allaoua and Paul Kieffer. We appreciated learning from Mr. Kieffer's many years of experience and information sharing will be very important as we work to establish a French office.

Overall, we are grateful for God's protection over a very productive trip and for being able to support our French-speaking brethren in France and West Africa during these Spring Holy Days.
