Update from Camp Hye Sierra

Camp Hye Sierra is a privately-owned facility built by Bob Mathias, two-time Olympic gold medalist. The camp offers a fantastic location perched high in the Sierra Mountains with towering trees. The campers can get away from the world and come together as a family of like minds and values to have fun, be challenged, try new things, and grow in understanding of God and His way in the "zone."



The camp has made improvements with a nicer paved road leading into the camp making a smooth trip from the main highway. The weather has been nearly perfect with temperatures in the moderate range during the day and crisp temperatures in the high 50s in the night making a warm blanket necessary for comfort.

On Sunday, all the campers arrived to our welcoming staff. After getting settled into their dorms, all gathered at the dining hall to have a nourishing dinner prepared by our volunteer kitchen staff. This year Tina Slocum is the lead in the kitchen and her team has enthusiastically served to provide delicious meals for the campers and staff members. Our kitchen staff has one of the most difficult jobs because they begin working on meals early and get off late.

On Sunday evening, we had a rousing Novelty Olympics activity coordinated by Assistant Camp Director, Ben Light. There was so much excitement and a whole lot of fun as we got to know one another better.

The theme of "God's Vision for You" has inspired us to push forward to the Kingdom of God with more dedication. Each day has encouraged campers to begin their story of obedience and submission to our Father in heaven and develop a close personal relationship with God. Each Christian Living class builds on that overall theme.



A dance took place by the camp lake in our main pavilion. It was a smashing success with a lot of fun! Also, by the lake Camp Hye Sierra has a big 4th of July picnic with the traditional grilled hamburgers and hot dogs and all the trimmings.

It is not uncommon at Hye Sierra to see the Sierra mountain wildlife. During one of the staff meetings for our

counselors a doe could be seen grazing nearby. One of our Australian staff members had never seen a deer, and his attention was naturally drawn to the special treat of nature. On Tuesday morning my wife and I saw a young doe eating right outside our cabin, and on one occasion we saw a deer grazing in the archery area. Of course, during archery class when the arrows were flying the deer was nowhere to be found.



One of the most unique activities at Hye Sierra is the opportunity to see the giant sequoias at the Sequoia National Forest in the beautiful Kings Canyon area. Those staff and campers who had not seen these giant miracles of nature were afforded the opportunity to see them. Our Ambassador Bible College coordinator, Dr. Frank Dunkle and his wife, Sue, who serve on the staff, and their son were awed to view these gargantuan trees.

All activities at the camp, such as speedaway, kickball, archery, basketball, capture the flag, bubble balls, volleyball, kayak water polo, the challenge course, and fishing have gone well.
