Like everything that God has made, the weekly Sabbath is ours to marvel at and meditate upon. And then, when God called us to His truth, we learned about His annual holy days! Those annual Sabbaths suddenly open wide our scope of understanding about what God is doing through mankind—and therefore, doing through us personally. In the meaning of the weekly Sabbath and annual holydays God reveals His incredible plan of salvation!

3. PASSOVER & DAYS OF UNLEAVENED BREAD

- Passover service after sundown Thursday evening, April 18, services at each of our congregation locations.
 Please arrive and be seated by 7:45 that evening. The Passover service will begin just after sundown and is for baptized members only.
- Day of Passover Friday, April 19 (de-leaven our homes by sunset)
- Night to Be Much Remembered Friday evening, April 19 gather together with other brethren for a special fellowship meal where possible
- **First Day of Unleavened Bread** Sabbath, April 20 an annual Sabbath. North Canton & Youngstown at Global Gateway. Pittsburgh & Wheeling at Chartiers Community Center. A single service with the holyday offering.
- **Days of Unleavened Bread** (avoid eating any leavened bread or leavening in other food products for the 7 days of the festival from sundown April 20 through sundown April 26)
- Last Day of Unleavened Bread Friday, April 26 an annual Sabbath, a double service holyday with the holyday offering at the morning service. North Canton & Youngstown meet at Global Gateway. Pittsburgh & Wheeling meet at Chartiers Community Center.

INTRODUCTION: The Psalms are divinely inspired songs. Many were written by King David and the rest by other leaders and priests in ancient Israel. Summaries are written by your pastor (lifted from my ABC Writings Class handout).

Ps. 110	Messianic, royal	O.T. proof of Jesus Christ's divinity with the Father from eternity past – 1-2 (see Matt.
		22:44). Reveals that Christ is High Priest in heaven after order of Melchizedek – 4 (see Heb.
		5:6, 10; 6:20). Prophecy of Christ as King of Kings to execute judgment in the time of the end
		and rule during the Millennium.
Ps. 111	Wisdom, praise	Praising God cements in our minds His glorious greatness – 2-3, the faithfulness of His
		covenant (both old and new) – 5 and humbles us before His awesome, imposing, true
		greatness or "fear"—which instills in our minds the core beginning of wisdom.
Ps. 112	Wisdom	The second step of true wisdom is to delight in God's law which defines His divine character
		– 1-5.
Ps. 113	Praise, Passover	Traditionally sung by the Jews at Passover. Carries the theme of humbling oneself before
		God and being blessed in His presence – 6-9.
Ps. 114	Passover,	Cites several of God's dramatic miracles in the Exodus and the command to tremble in His
	wisdom-history	divine presence – 7.
Ps. 115	Passover, praise	Set in the time of the Exodus, stresses the sovereignty of God – 3 and the foolishness of
		idols – 4-8. Israel was to trust in the LORD – 9 and the "house of Aaron," was especially to
		trust God to fulfill their priestly functions.
Ps. 116	Passover,	Prophecy of Christ's suffering and death – 3, resurrection – 8. Speaks of the "cup of
	messianic	salvation" – 13 (see Matt. 26:27), and a prophecy of Jesus being born of a woman – 16-17.
Ps. 117	Praise	The shortest Psalm that is much like a chorus that calls on all peoples, Gentiles included – 1,
		to praise God.
Ps. 118	Passover, praise	A call-and-answer section in 1-4 echoing the main point that God's mercy endures forever.
		Prophetic of the life and role of Jesus Christ being rejected by man, but supported by God
		the Father. Specific prophecy of Christ as the stone rejected by the builders – 22 (see Matt.
		21:42).
