

ISAIAH 13-24 REVIEW

Before we get to a few review questions on the section of Isaiah we have just completed in the Wednesday Zoom Bible Studies, it may be helpful to have a recap of this book, by the sections we have covered thus far.

Isaiah 1: The time of Isaiah (he prophesied from about 740 BC - 680 BC according to scholars and which is borne out by the prophecies God gave him, during the reign of four kings). The chapter is a judgment on Judah of that time, and has application to us today.

Isaiah 2-4: Notable scriptures that concern the future of Jerusalem (“Let us go up to the mountain of the Lord”)

Isaiah 5: God’s vineyard—a parable that illustrates how God works with us and how we should work together toward His purpose. We cited many places in the Bible where vineyards are discussed

Isaiah 6: Isaiah’s calling and commission; “how long” God’s message would be preached; the remnant of Israel.

Isaiah 7: Pivotal chapter in which King Ahaz’s complete resistance to God is discussed. In response, God gives Isaiah several prophecies concerning the nations which Ahaz fears (Syria and Israel) and cites their fall to Assyria. Very importantly, God gives the sign of the Messiah’s birth. This leads to several Messianic prophecies, as the Messiah is specifically mentioned in chapters 8-12.

Isaiah 8-12: Prophecies concerning Israel, Assyria, Judah, and the coming Messiah. Several Messianic prophecies in these chapters that were fulfilled perfectly by birth and life of Christ. Some of those prophecies relate to His second coming.

Isaiah 13-23: Prophecies after the death of Ahaz, concerning the nations in the area of Judah. These prophecies have been fulfilled in some cases; most are dual in nature.

Isaiah 24: A “summary” of the prophecies of Isaiah 13-23, leading to the prophesied return of Christ.
