# **News** At a Glance

#### **Treasurer's Report**

We now have the final results in for Pentecost, and we are pleased to report an encouraging 5.5 percent increase over last year for a total of \$867,000. In fact, each of the Spring Holy Day offerings this year has been encouraging. The final results for the First Day of Unleavened Bread was a 3.9 percent increase over last year for a total of \$856,000, and the final results for the Last Day of Unleavened Bread was a 3.1 percent increase over last year for a total of \$828,000.

As reported earlier, the months of February (9.39 percent increase), March (8.78 percent increase) and April (6.8 percent increase) were all trending higher than the 2 percent increase in income that we were experiencing year to date. The last two months, however, have not been as encouraging. In the month of May regular mail income was down 4.9 percent compared to last year, and for the month of June (through June 25) income is down 2.8 percent compared to last year.

While just a month and a half ago, I was confident that we would close the fiscal year with income \$23,500,000 or higher, we will most likely end the year slightly less than that—somewhere between \$23,400,000 and \$23,500,000. Even with the sluggish last two months of the year, we still expect to end the year with close to a 2 percent increase in income over last year, and we can be thankful for that.

With Les McCullough as guide, they also toured early locations where the Feast was held on the former Texas campus of Ambassador College to gather footage.

The release of the Apple iPhone and iPod Touch provided a new opportunity to reach mobile Web users with the gospel message. Internet Manager Aaron Booth, with assistance from Chris Stewart, developed a Web application that allowed UCG to get in on the ground floor.

The Apple Web site now features the *Beyond Today* commentaries as one of the Web applications an iPhone or iPod Touch user can access. These mobile Web users can watch or listen to the short commentaries on these mobile devices. We have already noticed an increase of Web traffic coming from the Apple Web site.

In July, Apple will be releasing an improved iPhone at a lower cost, so we are eagerly anticipating more people accessing our Web material from these types of mobile devices. - Implementing simple design strategies that will guide Web visitors to the content they are searching for on our Web

#### "Share This" Viral **Marketing Added** to Web Sites

Internet Manager Aaron Booth recently applied "viral marketing" techniques to many of UCG's Web pages. "Viral marketing (word-of-mouth) is a process where Web visitors find your Web site content valuable and want to share it with others. said Mr. Booth. "We have added a 'Share-This' feature to many of our Web pages. If a Web visitor clicks on one of the 'Share-This' links featured on an article Web page, then the individual can share this particular article with a friend via an e-mail message or post the article link to numerous social networking Web sites such as Facebook, MySpace or Twitter.

What does this mean? If one Web visitor found our content valuable and shared it with others via a social networking Web site, then that article could possibly be viewed by hundreds of additional people. Then those people could share it with their friends. By using viral-marketing techniques like this, we can increase the visibility of our Web sites to more people on the Web."

# Santiago, Chile, Church Hall Inaugurated

On the Sabbath of June 14, the new Church building in Santiago, Chile, was inaugurated with 450 people present. Many members from around Chile and one family from Argentina made the trip by bus for the occasion. Also present were Leon Walker, regional director for the Spanish area, with his wife, Reba, and special guests Jim and Sharron Franks from the home office. Mr. Franks is Ministerial Services operation manager.

The ceremony began with the cutting of the ribbon by Mr. Walker, Saul Langarica, pastor of the congregation, and Roberto Hernandez, a member and the builder and supervisor of the project. A beautiful plaque was then uncovered that stated in Spanish, "The Word of God is the Foundation of all Knowledge" and "This building was constructed for the honor and glory of God."

After the ceremony, the members took their seats for services. Before the formal services began, Mr. Walker spoke briefly, giving a history of the growth of the Church of God in Chile through the years

and explaining how we had grown to the point where having our own hall was a necessity.

He mentioned the many blessings from God during the building process and that the project was completed without debt and without a loan. He also rec-



fellowshipped. Then after sunset, an "esquinazo" or short show of music and dances was presented to welcome Mr. and Mrs. Franks.

Approximately 14,000 new Good News subscribers have been added from July 1. 2007, to June 30, 2008. Of that 14,000, over 3,400 have requested and received the Bible Study Course as well.

We have had a number of calls from people who have studied the first three lessons, expressing their gratitude for receiving such priceless, life-changing material. A few have asked about church services.

In addition, whenever we ran a print ad offering the course, the number of visits to the interactive Bible Study Course quiz on the Australian Web site nearly doubled, as a result of advertising the Web site address on the print ad.

# Canadian National Council Meets in Winnipeg

The summer meeting of the Canadian National Council was held June 1 and 2 in Winnipeg, Manitoba. Quite a few Church members along with their pastor, Herb Teitgen, sat in on the meetings. Prior to this, the Media and Ministerial Services Teams met on Thursday and Friday.

Since this was the first meeting of this fiscal year, the Council Code of Ethics and Council Member Job Description were read. New council member Patrick Read was welcomed and was asked to give a short icebreaker. Following that, Herb Teitgen talked about the rewards and challenges of serving a Canadian congregation while living in the United States.

A PowerPoint presentation from the Canadian office contained various graphs depicting growth patterns. Graemme Marshall reported on personal correspondence questions he has received.

The Media Team PowerPoint presentation showed statistics from the Beyond Today television program and the results of the recent Reader's Digest ads. The council was informed of future plans for the rest of the year.

Next, the Ministerial Services Team reported that leadership development is still an important issue for the Church. Canada is tapping into some of the U.S. programs. There will also be a ministerial conference later this year for all Canadian elders, as well as the Western Canada leadership workshop weekend in Calgary, Alberta, on June 21-22.

Each pastor gave an update on how the Spring Festival season went in his area. The trends are positive.

The National Office was asked to do a study regarding the potential need to move from the current office space. The council reviewed the study and referred it to the Strategic Planning/Finance Committee for further discussion. Next on the agenda was a discussion regarding the new Strategic Plan and Operation Plan that UCGIA approved. The question as to whether Canada should model next year's plan after these was also referred to the committee.

Monday began with a report from the Strategic Planning/Finance Committee. They submitted a resolution for ratification of expenditures to keep charitable purposes ratio in acceptable CRA guidelines. The committee will continue to work on the Strategic Plan for 2008-2009 to have it ready for council approval during the September teleconference. The committee also worked on strategies for the National Office to use for finding new office space.

The Governance Committee presented a proposal to amend the policy on establishing new churches and Bible study groups. A motion was passed to accept the amended document. An Elder Appeal Policy for Canada was approved by the council. Refinements to the lay member nominations process were also discussed.

The regular session ended with a brainstorming session. Then the council went into executive session to discuss designated funds and reserves and conduct the annual review of the director of operations.

#### **Peace Returns to** Kenya; Members **Face Drought**

The violence that troubled Kenya at the beginning of this year (leaving 1,500 dead and 600,000 homeless and/or displaced) has long since faded away. However, the rift among tribes continues below the surface. Only by allowing both rival parties to win (through a power-sharing agreement) was the bloodbath halted.

Meanwhile, many of our members there have been impacted by a seasonal drought. Their crops failed and they have been unable to grow food or purchase it without assistance. World prices of food, seed, fertilizer and petrol have all skyrocketed, and Kenya's 20 percent inflation rate further compounds the situation.

A Good Works project to assist the members there with supplemental food is listed on the UCG Web site at www.ucg.org/goodworks.

During July Tim Waddle and his wife, Valerie, will visit the region. Some of the items on his agenda include leadership training, Festival logistics assessment and congregational visits.

A meeting with leaders of a group that left WCG years ago and attended with another affiliation is also scheduled. They have formally requested to be part of United. Their additional numbers could potentially swell Feast attendance this year and may dictate a change of venue. Thankfully, a suitable site has become available at a price that would be considerably less per person than in previous years.

#### **Lightbulb Man Lessons**

"Consider it pure joy, my brothers, whenever you face trials of many kinds," James tells us (James 1:2, New International Version). So easy to say, but oh, so hard to do! After a recent fiery trial, I discovered a good lesson from the lightbulb man, who helped remind me to see the light.

I came across a most interesting story about Thomas Edison, a story that can help put an end to self-pity. I had a 36-hour bug of that recently and, lo and behold, I stumbled across this story and it, along with the book of James, reminded me that trying times are a normal part of this life. They present an opportunity to strengthen my foundation of joy.

Thomas Edison invented over 1,000 things in addition to the lightbulb and phonograph.

As amazing as his inventions are, I was particularly interested to discover that this man of genius and invention struggled with dyslexia, a learning disability I also faced. Since it was undiagnosed, it was all the more frustrating. Despite this, Edison found ways to learn from his failures.

Did you know that in 1914 one of Edison's buildings caught fire and it quickly spread to most of his other factory and laboratory buildings? Thomas Edison, his employees and fire companies from all around did their best to fight the fire and protect the remaining buildings, but little was spared.

The next morning as he looked at the smoldering rubble, Edison is reported to have said, "There is great value in disaster. All our mistakes are burned up. Thank God we can start anew."

What an incredible attitude! This story caught my eye big time since I have recently been through a house fire that produced some real pain and sorrow those first couple of days afterward. (My house was saved, but

there was structural damage, as well as some water and smoke damage that left me with a bad case of that 36-hour bug of self-pity.) However, upon reading about Mr. Edison's experience, I realized I needed to see it like Edison did—to be able to see beyond the disaster to the potential ahead.

His words pierced me like a knife, since as a pastor, father and husband, I was in somewhat of a state of shock as I thought about my defeated and discouraged attitude of the day. Where I had lost some noticeable money and time, this man had lost much of his life's work. Where I had chosen to see the remaining rubble of the day, this man chose to see the future that awaited him. When I longed to hide under the covers, this man took joy in the good that would come from his loss.

Lamentations 3:22-23 says, "Because of the LORD's great love we are not consumed, for his compassions never fail. They are new every morning; great is your faithfulness" (NIV)

If you're feeling frustrated, defeated and discouraged by the trials in your life today, I want to encourage you to look beyond the rubble to what lies ahead. It can be difficult to face our trials with the kind of spirit that sees great value in disaster, but that's what God expects from us if we are to be men and women who walk on their foundation of joy.

Thomas Edison's statement sums up the truth about spiritual growth perfectly: trials are the foundation of joy for spiritual maturity. God is growing us in the image of His Son, the Captain of our salvation who was made perfect through suffering (Hebrews 2:10).

A major way we grow is through the trials that arrive on our doorstep. Through it all we can rely on God: "For You are my rock and my fortress; for Your name's sake You will lead me and guide me" (Psalm 31:3, New American Standard).

# Turning the Hearts . . . Hanging Out and Dating

When you spend time with those of the opposite sex—is that hanging out or dating? In Practical Christianity class at Ambassador Bible Center we have had this discussion. We came to the conclusion that the terminology has changed through the years. What used to be called "dating" is now considered a part of "hanging out." At the present time "dating" refers to what we used to term serious dating or "going steady."

Whatever term is used, the Proverbs reveal that "there are three things which are too wonderful for me, yes, four which I do not understand: ...the way of a man with a virgin" (Proverbs 30:18-19).

Something almost magical seems to take place when that special connection is made between a man and a woman that leads to them liking each other. They want to spend time with each other. They put on rose-colored glasses and see each other in a fantasized manner. Something actually occurs in the brain that helps them gloss over any flaws and elevates the strengths of the beloved.

To make sure you are not overwhelmed when in love, it is good to force yourself to stop and think. What is needed for a relationship to continue to develop?

Here are several things to consider when going from "hanging out" to dating. Does the person you are interested in have these characteristics:

- Adaptability—Is he or she able to accept changes in schedule and circumstances?
- Empathy—Does he or she feel for others; read your moods; relate?
- Problem-solving—Does he or she seek resolution instead of sweeping problems "under the rug"?
- Is he or she able to give and receive love?
- Emotional stability—Is he or she usually even in moods rather than having wide mood swings?
- Similarity in family background—Are your family values and family rituals similar?
- Similarity in interests—Are you able to relate in leisure time?
- Good communications—Are you able to talk to each other about any and everything?
- Spiritual soundness—Does the person maintain a deep love for God and His way?

Marriage and family counselors consider these characteristics essential for having successful relationships.

So, when moving from the "hanging out" stage to serious dating, please keep your eyes open and your mind active to note if that special person has the characteristics that will contribute to a happy, successful, lasting relationship.

May God bless you in your quest to find the loving person for you (Proverbs 18:22).

# Learning Leadership Through Service

■ We learned many spiritual lessons from the Challenger II Rock Climbing Program.

As a participant in the December 2007 Challenger II Rock Climbing Program on Mt. Lemmon in Arizona, I came away from the weeklong experience with more than thicker calluses on my fingertips and many newly formed friendships. The environment of Challenger II also instilled a renewed desire for practicing leadership through service as an ongoing, lifelong commitment.

Based on the notion that *leadership* is not office; *leadership* is influence, this camp program is designed intentionally for young adult leadership development. It stressed the importance of living a life of *conviction*, *commitment* and *courage* in order to continue to develop godly character.

In a world that challenges our beliefs and values on a daily basis, the lessons I learned from participating in Challenger II and the related service component have helped me continue to stay strong in God's way of life and overcome, knowing that we seek out a greater reward directed at a higher purpose (1 John 5:4; Matthew 5:12; 6:20; Luke 6:23; Romans 8:28).

The following reflections illustrate how service can be defined as *leader-ship in action* directed toward a godly purpose that helps us build character and influence others, while allowing God's grace and the fruits of His Spirit to serve

as a greater testimony to the work He is accomplishing now on earth in each of our lives.

#### **Finding and Filling Needs**

One of the initial building blocks of servant leadership is realizing that *any-one* can—and should—serve. There are no prerequisites to participation besides your willingness and personal commitment. We often make many excuses for not stepping up to serve or lead even when opportunities are all around us. There are many ways you can serve, from simply brightening someone's day through offering encouraging words to organizing an ongoing program to help meet reoccurring needs in your local congregation or community.

Taking an active role as a member of God's greater family requires awareness of these needs combined with enthusiastic and dedicated participation in order to meet them. In this way, servant leadership is both an *attitude* and an *action*.

The choices we make to participate and invest our time, energy and effort into something larger than ourselves can lead to greater acts of service that have far-reaching effects. The impact of your service goes beyond the action itself, influencing the lives of those you serve and others who see your example of good works (Matthew 5:15; Ephesians 2:10).

Begin by recognizing the innate strengths and talents you have been blessed with as a unique individual, intentionally designed by your Father to do great works (Matthew 25:14-30; Romans 12:6). Then apply these talents to become

a person of influence in the lives of others. Allow God's glory to be revealed through your actions as a servant leader.

Servant leadership is not just a weekend project, a one-time visit to a sick friend or simply mailing a card of encouragement to someone who is experiencing a hard trial. Rather, *service is a lifestyle*—the ongoing dedication of investing your time and ability into helping others in need

# The *How* and *Why* of Service

Additionally, godly service doesn't always have to involve *doing* something. It can simply involve being there as an encouraging and comforting presence. The attitude we bring to the active component of service can be more important than the product of our service.

In this way, service is not just focused on where you serve or who you serve, but extends into *how* and *why* you serve. While it is hard to stop *doing*, and simply *be present* with others, sometimes our attention and consideration are what the other person truly wants and needs. Serve with an open heart and willing attitude.

True service occurs when we submit to God, showing His love to others through our attitude and actions (Galatians 5:13). Jesus Christ is the ultimate example of a servant leader who submitted His life to God's greater purpose in order to demonstrate a greater love for humanity. Knowing that His death was eminent, Christ still modeled servant leadership through humility by washing the disciples' feet

during His last Passover with them (John 13:3-5, 13-17).

Even when tempted by Satan, Christ humbled Himself and overcame the world by sacrificing His very life for the sake of our eternal salvation (Matthew 4:1-11; John 16:33). The love and example Christ showed through His ministry on earth and ongoing love for us as sisters and brothers is the greatest example of service (Matthew 20:28).

#### Responsibility

Leadership through service also requires *responsibility* that extends beyond our personal desires and considers the broader implications and needs of those you are serving and leading. This process involves understanding the situation from multiple perspectives and counting the costs involved in order to act guided by godly wisdom and appropriate counsel (Proverbs 11:14; 15:28; Luke 14:28).

Because of this added responsibility of leadership, serving in this capacity may require making difficult decisions that inevitably disappoint some of those who are following and participating. Therefore, leadership is not always doing what is popular, but rather it is doing what is wise and necessary given the circumstances.

These biblical lessons of servant leadership illustrate the pressing necessity for us to submit our lives in service to others, while being led by God's greater purpose for humanity (Proverbs 3:5-6). The many opportunities to become involved in service now are valuable training tools

to help us develop the character necessary to serve and lead in God's coming Kingdom.

Don't wait to be invited to serve or make excuses to prevent your participation now. Start small and locally by forming deeper and more authentic relationships with others that will allow you to better recognize their needs. Encourage and motivate others using your unique talents and gifts. Pray often and be proactive in your service mentality. Ask for opportunities to get involved and be mentored by others.

Remain teachable and humble, seeking to learn from all experiences in order to grow. Accept feedback and respond graciously to correction. Don't be discouraged, but rather remain steadfast in your ongoing desire to serve.

While the life of a servant leader is oftentimes thankless and occurs behind the scenes, know that God is always watching and taking note of our attitude and actions, helping guide us along the path to eternal righteousness. And as we continue to persevere and overcome in this life as we practice servant leadership, God has promised a much greater reward in His coming Kingdom (Romans 8:18-25). UN

Twelve ministers and other adults completed a Wilderness First Aid (WFA) course following the annual General Conference of Elders at Cincinnati. The 16-hour course covered basic skills needed to deal with emergencies and other health situations in the wilderness and other back-country settings.

The focus of training was on response and assessment, musculoskeletal injuries, environmental emergencies, survival skills, soft tissue injuries and medical emergencies.

Those certified in this Wilderness First Aid skills course included staff members from the United Youth Camp program (Gary Black, Howard Davis, Frank Dunkle, Cody Kitts, Scott Lord and Nathan Willoughby); the Challenger II young adults program (Jon Pinelli and Paul Luecke); and ministers who serve in international areas

For the camp program, WFA certification is required of staff members who conduct challenge-type activities. The course included both class time and "hands-on" time, where teams practiced dealing with emergency scenarios that were set up by the instructor. The course was taught by SOLO (Stonehearth Open Learning Opportunities), an organization that specializes in training and certifying various levels of medical skill sets.

#### **Church Members' Efforts Secure** Scholarship for **UCG** Teen

When Kayleen Hannaway, a 2008 high school graduate in the Salem, Oregon, congregation, learned she had been accepted at Vanderbilt University, she was very excited. Her parents were too, until they saw the \$54,000-a-year price tag. They told Kayleen to work for scholarships. One she applied for online was the Zinch. com scholarship that offered \$20,000.

Early in the spring, Kayleen received an e-mail from Zinch.com informing her that they had selected her as a finalist from 150,000 applications. Zinch then asked the 200 finalists to vie for online votes to win the scholarship. Neither Kayleen nor her parents were thrilled with the twist the competition took to online voting. But since the odds had improved immensely from 150,000 to 200 and Kayleen had already put in time and effort, she endured.

The online voting was a hybrid of American Idol voting and March Madness basketball bracketing. Each week, Kayleen was pitted against another applicant and was expected to solicit votes online. That is difficult for someone not keen about door-to-door sales, school candy drives or other solicitation. Not to mention that Kayleen lives in a town with a population of 4,530 people.

Kayleen also knew her biography, which featured her religious viewpoint, would now be seen by many others as she tried to earn more votes. As time progressed, religion came to the fore in many discussions.

One week, with 14 minutes to go before the voting ended, Kayleen went to her old middle school. The office personnel used the intercom to ask if everyone who was in the building who had not voted for Kayleen would meet in the computer lab to vote. Students in the middle school jazz band were in school early that morning and rushed to the library to vote. Kayleen won that morning by a slim margin thanks to her previous band teacher who escorted her jazz novices to the computer lab in

As the weeks passed, it was obvious that networking would need to escalate, so e-mails were sent to radio, TV and other media sources. A television station in Eugene reminded viewers almost daily to vote for the local contestant. The local radio station encouraged their morning commuters to vote at work.

Kayleen's aunt, Kit Mohr, a professor at the University of North Texas, sought help from students. A cousin at the University of Wisconsin plastered his Facebook and MySpace pages with links and prompts. Other family members in Colorado, Indiana, Maryland and Florida contacted everyone in their business and personal address books who, in turn, did the same.

Local Church members began to learn about the scholarship opportunity and contacted other Church members for help. As Kayleen advanced through the brackets, information was placed on the Elders' Forum, and Victor Kubik put a link on his Web site. Even amidst the Spring Holy Days, the scurry and creativity brought success, and on April 23, Kayleen was named the Sweet Diggity Dawg \$20K Scholarship winner.

Kayleen wishes to thank the many Church members who endured to support one of their own in this unconventional opportunity.

"Thank you for all who were generous enough to give their time to help me. I know it was an annoyance for some, while for others it was exciting and energizing. Of course, I could not have won without the willingness of others to take time and send the information to their contacts that I did not know. I definitely do not know 7,400 people," Kayleen said.

After winning, Kayleen had a number of radio, newspaper and TV interviews. She tried to emphasize in the interviews that her Church family had been a major pipeline of support and diligence.



# Tribute: Carl Dailey

Carl Dailey was born March 20, 1930, in South Bend, Indiana. He died suddenly of a heart attack June 16, 2008. He was 78 years old and very active in the Church and in his career until his death.



#### **Staff Prepares for U.S. Postal Changes**

Connie Seelig (Mail Processing Department) and Chris Stewart (Information Technology Department) attended the National Postal Forum in Anaheim, California, May 16 to 21. These four days included two general sessions (including an address from the postmaster general) and 17 seminar sessions.

The focus of the forum was on the new barcoding system. The Postal Service is moving toward including many of the existing barcodes and information into one "intelligent" barcode that will take up less space on the envelope. For United Church of God mailings, it would include the address change service code and the postnet barcode. If we chose to use confirmation in the future, it would include that as well.

One benefit to the Church would be reduced cost on mail returns and quicker information return regarding changes of address. The new barcode will also help the Postal Service move toward reducing paperwork and submitting postage statements electronically.



#### Interesting Development: Arabic Translation Offer

This spring the United Church of God received a letter from an Iraqi national now living in Bonn, Germany, who offered to translate our booklet The Middle East in Bible Prophecy into Arabic. Peter Eddington, from Media and Communications Services, asked Paul Kieffer, UCG pastor and coordinator in Germany, to contact the man and determine whether his offer was genuine.

June 2 Mr. Kieffer met with the man. His English is excellent, and he has already translated five books from Arabic into English. Mr. Kieffer asked him why he wants to translate our booklet. He said he has been reading *The Good News* for some time now. He mentioned that he couldn't find anything wrong in our literature compared with the Bible. He said the booklet provides excellent insight into the background of the Middle East situation that needs to be made available to Arabic readers.

He agreed to translate the booklet introduction for us to evaluate and, upon getting the green light, he would do the rest of the booklet. He said he believes by translating our booklet for free he would be helping to promote peace. Mr. Kieffer was surprised the next day to receive an e-mail with the completed translation assignment. It has now been proofread and checked for doctrinal accuracy. Since then, two more chapters have been translated and are now being proofread.

Many factors have to be considered in expanding into another language, such as whether the Church has the expertise and resources to answer questions and maintain contact with Arabic speakers who may respond to the message. And doing professional booklet layouts in Arabic will be a challenge. There are millions of Arabic-speaking Christians in the world, so your prayers about this are appreciated. UN
