The seniors had a two-course luncheon overlooking the Merimbula Bay entrance at the headlands to the sea. The teens attempted to play nine holes of golf on the relaxing Tura Beach course. There was a vibrant and warm open house dinner for all, hosted at the accommodation of two members. On another day, members boarded a boat cruise on a beautiful afternoon where some playful whales were spotted migrating past Merimbula. And finally, there was a night of exotic dining at a Tapas and Bar Cantina, which filled everyone with delicious food.

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Portland Sabbath Keepers Learn of Holy Days, **Donate to LifeNets for Zambian Brethren**

Prior to the Feast, Victor Kubik, who directs LifeNets, was contacted by some Sabbath-keeping Eastern European immigrants from Portland, Oregon, who wished to drill a well for those in need in Zambia. It turned out their trip coincided with the Feast of Tabernacles, and arrangements were made for Sergey Batrutdinov and Arkaedyi Antononvich of that church to stay at the Feast site.

Their group "Church of Christians of Seventh Day" includes 600 Sabbath keepers from Kazakhstan and Uzbekistan who sought asylum from religious persecution. Arkaedyi's grandfather actually spent 14 years in Siberia for keeping the Sabbath. They fit in well with our members and attended services on the Sabbath and Eighth Day, even participating with a song and a short sermonette on the Sabbath. They read

from Isaiah and explained why they had come. I was able to discuss at length the meaning of God's Feast days and why we keep them. They knew of the Holy Days, but did not know how they fit into New Covenant worship or why they should be kept.

They were moved by our hospitality and joined the activities, including purchasing fruit and ice cream for family day. They also decided to do wells in two villages for our people instead of one. They invited me to come to Portland to visit with their group. Mr. Kubik is already planning to visit them later this year.

Visit to South Africa

Prior to the Feast, Michelle and I visited South Africa where I was able to tour the office housed in the home of Neil and Isella Wallace and have dinner with Jason and Monique Webster. Growth has been significant as the Good News mailing list has gone from 5,000 at the recent split to over 28,000. The Kingdom of God Seminars were some of the highest attended this year. I was able to discuss the recent return of many brethren to UCG after they found out we are not changing doctrines or any of the truths of God.

I spoke on Atonement in Johannesburg prior to departing for Malawi and laid out Christ's reconciliation plan



The Mind of Christ vs. the Mind of Satan

Two opposing ways of life are portrayed by the mind of Satan and the mind of Jesus Christ.

Our mindset determines how we live and what our values will be. God's mindset is love. Love is an outward focus and the way of give. Satan is self. Self is an inward focus and the way of get. Paul instructed the Philippians to put away selfishness. To not do anything through selfish ambition or conceit. To look out for the interests of others. To esteem others better than themselves. He described that as taking on the mind of Christ (Philippians 2:1-11).

We can take the contrast between the mind of Satan and the mind of Christ one step further by considering Proverbs 29:11: "A fool vents all his feelings, but a wise man holds them back." Christ's way of loving and giving includes exercising restraint. Satan's way of selfishness and getting is to cast off restraint. Esau is described as a profane person who sold his birthright for one morsel of food. He traded his incredible future promise for just a moment's satisfaction. Later, when he wanted to inherit the blessing, there was no going back. His desire for immediate gratification caused him very deep regrets (Hebrews 12:14-17).

Works of the Flesh vs. Fruit of the Spirit

Our flesh cries out to be satisfied but, in responding, we must be careful to act with restraint. The works of the flesh include outbursts of wrath and selfish ambitions while the fruit of the Spirit includes exercising self-control (Galatians 5:19-24). The works of the flesh and the fruit of the Spirit take us in totally opposing directions.

Exodus 32 is the account of Israel worship-

ping before the gold calf that Aaron made. The account records that after Aaron fashioned the molded calf and declared a feast, the people sat down to drink and rose up to play. It says that Aaron had not restrained them, to their shame. In response, God determined to destroy them, but Moses pleaded on their behalf. Verse 14 records, "So the LORD relented from the harm which He said He would do to His people." God punished Israel for their sin, but even in correction. He exercised restraint. He continued to work with them as His people. It is instructive that God sent a plague on Israel when they gave themselves up to craving for meat (Numbers 11), but He was going to destroy them for idolatry. There is a difference between temporarily giving in to sin and making provision to sin day after day

One sin we face today that goes beyond just temporary weakness is involvement with pornography. It has become particularly destructive in our time because of its easy access in the media and on the Internet. It becomes deeply embedded in people's thoughts and habits and also impacts the relationships they maintain. Still, as difficult as any battle may be, we must not make provision for sin. Paul listed doing so as being in opposition to putting on [the mind of] Jesus Christ (Romans 13:11-14).

The Sons of Eli the Priest

Eli was a priest and a judge in Israel when the tabernacle stood in Shiloh. His sons were disrespectful and corrupt, and they troubled the people when they came to make sacrifices and to give offerings. They even had sex with some of the women. It ultimately cost them their lives. It cost Eli dearly as well. By giving in to them in their sin he brought a curse of suffering and death on his descendants, and his lineage was removed from the priesthood. Even though Eli had warned his sons against what they were doing, he took no action. The Bible says, "His sons made themselves

vile, and he did not restrain them" (1 Samuel 3:13). It is not enough for us to just refuse to do evil. We must also choose to do good.

The importance of our mindset can hardly be overstated. The words we say, the example we set and the actions we take impact our future and the future of those around us. My wife Michelle was in a head-on car accident in college. A drunk driver came across the line and hit the car she was a passenger in. The driver, in his consumption of alcohol, had cast off restraint. It is Satan's way. The actions of a complete stranger, in just a moment, left her with serious consequences that remain to this day.

In this life we can strive to give, or we can seek to get. We can be outwardly focused, or we can be self-focused. We can exercise restraint in the fear of God, or we can cast off restraint. These choices all have one thing in common. They portray the difference between the mind of Satan and the mind of Jesus Christ. UN

Leap

■ Knowing enough to really know better.

Caught.

Clinging, trembling, in the space between where we've been and where we should be. We can't stay here long; we have to make a choice. We can, by sheer negligence or succumbing to the paralysis brought on by indecision or fear, allow ourselves to be pulled back to the temporal comfort of the familiar; the crumbling ledge below our feet.

Or, we can leap.

Baptized or not, you will face this if God is working with you. Depending on where you are on the spiritual continuum that God has customized for you, this moment of choice will happen infrequently at crossroads of crisis, or perhaps it will happen multiple times a day, hundreds or thousands of times a year with relatively smaller matters. We may even be faced with the same choice over and over again until it becomes a habit—for good or bad.

If we know enough to recognize our own fears of truly submitting to God and seeking Him, we have a choice to make. Do I cling to the emotional safety of my crumbling ledge? Or do I let go and leap toward the other side? Fear overwhelms us: the fear of letting go of the fingerhold that connects us with our world. The world.

Putting our attention on those tenuous connections can blind us to the infinitely better things God has prepared for us. We know the prophet Daniel became a great tool in God's hand, but consider how the story of his life in Babylon began. Imagine what it might have been like to have friends and relatives killed in a conquest, to be yourself captured and taken away from home to live in Babylon and to serve the very king who was responsible for the aforementioned. How alone and defiled Daniel might have felt! He was truly surrounded by pagan society and it would have been so very easy for him to just do whatever his captors said, while reasoning that God could not expect him to do otherwise in the face of such impossible odds.

However, Daniel "purposed in his heart that he would not defile himself with the portion of the king's delicacies, nor with the wine which he drank; therefore he requested of the chief of the eunuchs that he might not defile himself" (Daniel 1:8).

Daniel did two things: He made the decision internally to do what he knew to be right, and then he took a physical action to show God he meant it. Can we remember this, when we're caught between choices? To God, Daniel was "a man greatly beloved." And when Daniel was making one of his leaps, and looking to God for his salvation, he was sent a messenger from God who said, "Do not fear, Daniel, for from the first day that you set your heart to understand,

and to humble yourself before your God, your words were heard, and I have come because of your words" (Daniel 10:11-12). How encouraging this is to see that God is faithful if we make better choices.

Jehoshaphat is known as a king who made big mistakes, and he was told by the prophet Jehu that the LORD was angry at him, but "nevertheless good things are found in you, in that you have removed the wooden images from the land, and have prepared your heart to seek God" (2 Chronicles 19:3). In his example we again see two layers that are important to God: a physical action and a spiritual action. God requires both.

We have to purpose in our hearts to not only obey God's commands (the law), but to also heed His guidance, which may not be listed specifically in any scripture, but is given to us through His Holy Spirit daily, as long as we are willing to accept His help.

The Holy Spirit and You

So how do we really know when God is trying to work with us through His Spirit?

If we are living on the edge of commitment, it could be an annoyingly persistent thread of doubt winding around areas of our lives. Should I really be watching these kinds of movies? Did it really happen like I just said it did? I probably should have done something better with my time. I forgot to pray today! Again!

It could be a niggling question that we quickly brush aside. Is this really good for my mind to have access to? Should I really be talking about this? Should I really be here? Am I putting myself in a situation where it will be easier to do wrong than right?

What questions keep popping up that you really don't *want* to know the answer to? What seemingly small prickles of conscience keep pinging you throughout your daily life? These are usually not just random, but are frequently how God works with us through the Holy Spirit! (See 1 Samuel 24:5, John 14:26).

If addressed quickly and with open, honest prayer, these kinds of questions will serve to draw us closer to God, which in turn will

help us avoid much heartache and struggle. Brushing them off may be more convenient for the moment, but really means that we are brushing off God's helping hand! We're in effect saying to God: "No, thanks. I'd rather keep hanging on to this fraying rope than trust You completely."

I speak from experience, as I have done it myself, many times. I have been unwilling to give up things I wanted, and went through the mental gymnastics routine required to make those things seem as though they were "probably okay" with God. *Probably. God didn't say* specifically *not to do that, so...*

I have many times been caught up in a world in which either I was the center, or my family, or my secular education. God was around...well, somewhere. At least I thought He was because I went to church every week, and read the Bible at least semiregularly, and prayed for God to forgive me for my sins (at least the ones I would admit to). But my life at these points was much more focused on not technically breaking God's law in the black-and-white, and less focused on drawing closer to God by seeking His preference in gray areas.

But God has helped me realize that allowing such flimsy reasoning to guide my behavior and attitudes was leading me away from the Kingdom of God, not toward it. That Kingdom-of-God compass can be a huge help when facing any choice we have as Christians. In the gray areas, where discerning right and wrong seems much more complex, we must ask *where* we are being led, and *by whom*?

Forgetting Those Things Which Are Behind

For most of us, a road-to-Damascus kind of intervention is pretty rare. Our calling is quiet but persistent for a time. Our Father is waiting for a response from us before He comes closer. He's waiting for us to take that deep breath and say something like: "Yes, Father, I want You more than I want any of the temporary satisfaction that comes from putting other things first. I am going to *do something* about it *right now* and I'm asking you to please help me, because it's really hard to let go!"

We have to let go of all our pretence, all our self-deceit in order to let God work wonders in us (John 4:21-24). Once we do, God allows us into another level of closeness with Him, and *nothing else* can compare to the beauty and pleasure of that relationship! It's the euphoria of first love, multiplied by a hundred (Hosea 10:12).

We also have to talk ourselves down from the unhealthy fears that keep us separated from God. Once, when Jesus' disciples saw Him walking on the sea to their boat, they were understandably afraid of what their eyes were seeing! But after He told them, "It is I; do not be afraid," they welcomed Him into the boat. Jesus then had a miracle for

Puerto Vallarta, Mexico

The Mexican Feast was again held in sunny and warm Puerto Vallarta. We witnessed how God truly controls the weather, for the weather forecast had predicted heavy rains during a week of the Feast, but instead we only enjoyed sunny days.

There were 580 brethren in attendance, 500 from the United States, 65 from Mexico and 15 who hailed from the countries of Chile, Canada, Australia, Barbados and Austria. The next day there was a cruise on the replica of a Spanish galleon, with snorkeling at a private beach and meals included aboard.

Not much traveling off-site was necessary because the meeting hall was on the second floor of the hotel and the pools and beach are a stone's throw away.

What we are most thankful about was how God miraculously spared two of the Mexican brethren (one was a deacon) from a fatal car accident as they traveled to the Feast site. They were going downhill on a slick, rainy mountain road when the deacon

lost control of the vehicle. They were headed directly off a cliff, but suddenly, he felt the steering wheel turn sharply and the pedal accelerate so instead of going off the cliff, the vehicle made a perfect U-turn and was stopped by the guard rail at just the right angle so the van was halted and they avoided going off the cliff. One of them just had a few scratches, and they both made it to the Feast in other vehicles.

Another miracle happened when a "Mexican couple" arrived right away with a big pickup truck and told them to hand them the most valuable Church equipment from the damaged van. Why did the deacon become so trustful in such an unlikely circumstance? He said the man had the same facial features as a young boy that was like a nephew to him, so he felt perfectly at ease to turn all the valuable Church equipment over to them, although the Feast site was four hours away.

The man told the deacon, "Give me all the valuable equipment and I will take it to the hotel where you are holding the convention, since I'm going that way." Then he said, "Do it quickly, for 'the vultures' [the looters], will soon arrive to pick clean the damaged van of all the valuable goods [which is the norm]."

A few hours later, at 12:00 a.m., the couple arrived at the hotel with all the Church equipment intact (which included sound and video equipment for the start of the Feast later that day). Yet they refused to take any money either from the deacon at the site or from me at the hotel. It was all very strange, as if they were horrified at taking any money for their services. They then disappeared into the night, and left me with an uncanny feeling of having met "angels unawares" (Hebrews 13:2). Thanks to this, the Feast was able to start without a hitch.



husband and being surrounded by grandchildren who thought the world of her. She was preceded in death by her husband, John Paul Veit, in 1995, and by two brothers and one sister.



The team of staff, which consisted of about 40 teens, young adults, mothers, fathers and grandparents even came up with a selforganized pool monitoring rotation at the super-fun lazy river. Yes, these same staff did perpetuate some silly antics like squirting cold water on people as they floated by, but the smiles showed that everyone really enjoyed their time.

The theme for this year's camp was about service, and there were several ways that was shown. The littlest girls learned how to serve drink, napkins and a snack at a very pink tea party. The littlest boys learned with the help of a Lego set that, as one young camper put it, "There is no way we

can build the car without everyone working together." The teens came up with a great way to show the older kids how to help each other through leading their blindfolded fellow camper through a teen-designed obstacle course. "But whoever desires to be great among you, let him be your servant," came to mind (Matthew 20:26).

So although camp had tropical leanings, it led the kids to a thought process that fit perfectly into the then-upcoming festival season, because there are a lot of service opportunities there, too. We at Camp Tomahawk hope you enjoyed your Feast and that it was as spiritually refreshing as camp was this summer. **UN**



them: Their vessel was immediately at their destination (John 6:19-21).

In our lives, too, accepting how God may change our lives can be frightening at first, because it means giving up the familiar. But our fears begin to melt away as we invest ourselves in this most important relationship and realize that we didn't actually give up anything valuable. Once we make a real commitment, no matter how small, God gives us a boost! Try to remember the encouraging message that God had for Daniel: "O man greatly beloved, fear not: Peace be to you; be strong, yes, be strong!"

As we make finer and finer tunings in the details of our lives in an effort to not only do His will but to *love* His will and *seek it above all else*, He draws us ever nearer. The things we once thought were so important pale in comparison to this personal relationship with our Father in heaven! "Forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are

before, I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus" (Phil 3:13-14). It's hard to forget about the things of our world when our eyes are on them constantly. We have to actually make a conscious effort to pull our gaze away from those distractions and look intently for God's instruction.

A Gift Is Offered

Can we appreciate the awesome opportunity we have, right now? When we read God's inspired words: "Awake to righteousness, and do not sin; for some do not have the knowledge of God. I speak this to your shame" (1 Corinthians 15:34), this should be a wake-up call. Not everyone has been offered this gift right now. And not everyone offered the gift has an ear to hear, but if you do, please consider: What can the Father say about us right now? What about tomorrow? What will Jesus Christ our Brother say about our physical and spiritual behaviors, attitudes and actions? What words will God use to describe our journey?
